**RE: Postponement of Presidential Preference Primary Election**

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Under the authority of O.C.G.A. § 21-2-50.1 and after careful consideration and consultation with county election officials, political party leadership, and state elected officials, Secretary of State Brad Raffensperger suspended in-person voting for the March 24, 2020 Presidential Preference Primary ("PPP") as of March 15, 2020. In-person voting will resume on April 27, 2020 to coincide with the May 19, 2020 statewide General Primary Election. Secretary Raffensperger made this change because of the escalating threat and spread of the Covid-19 virus and out of concern for the safety and welfare of election officials, poll workers, voters, and public welfare.

In-person voting was suspended on March 15, 2020 and will re-open as planned on April 27, 2020. Absentee by mail ballots will begin to go out as planned on March 31, 2020. Ballots that have already been cast in the PPP will be counted, and those ballots and memory cards should be securely stored. Ballot builders are building the May 19, 2020 ballots so that voters who have not yet voted in PPP will have both the PPP and the statewide primary election contests. Voters who have already voted in the PPP will receive a General Primary ballot without the PPP races/questions. Any voter who registers up until the April 20, 2020 voter registration deadline for the May 19<sup>th</sup> statewide general primary will be eligible to vote in both the general primary and the PPP. You should begin preparations now for a significant increase in absentee by mail ballots as well as ensuring that you have a sufficient number of backup poll workers and polling locations for in-person voting. The Secretary of State's office will send further guidance on specifics regarding these issues.

The Secretary of State's Office will continue to work with the 159 county election officials to clarify any necessary changes in procedures in order to continue to provide Georgians with safe, secure and accessible elections.

### General Information

The Presidential Preference Primary (PPP) has been moved from 3/24/2020 to be held in conjunction with the 5/19/2020 General Primary and Nonpartisan General Election. These elections will be combined. There will be one database that contains all of the ballot styles for votes cast on 5/19/2020 and during the early voting period. Ballots that have been cast for the PPP will be counted. The PPP has not been cancelled. In-person voting for the PPP was suspended on 3/15/2020 and will resume on 4/27/2020, in conjunction with the 5/19/2020 general primary.

### Defined Terms

PPP Ballot – A ballot that contains only the Presidential Preference Primary and any other elections planned to be held in conjunction with the PPP on 3/24/2020.

May Ballot – A ballot that contains only the ballot choices originally scheduled to be conducted on 5/19/2020.

Combined Ballot – A ballot that contains both the PPP Ballot and May Ballot choices.

### Voter Registration Applications

Continue to hold voter registration applications with a registration date of 2/24/2020 or greater until Monday, 3/23/2020. Beginning on 3/23/2020, process voter registration applications with registration up to the 4/20/2020 registration deadline for the combined General Primary / Nonpartisan General Elections / Presidential Preference Primary.

## **Absentee Ballot Applications**

Continue to accept absentee ballot applications and issue PPP Ballots through Friday, 3/20/2020 when receiving absentee ballot applications clearly marked for the 3/24/2020 PPP.

No ballot that only contains the PPP races should be issued after 3/20/2020.

Any absentee ballot application that does not contain an election date or is clearly marked for the 5/19/2020 election should be considered an application for the combined election on 5/19/2020. These applications can still be processed but registrars must wait until the first day that absentee ballots for the 5/19/2020 election are permitted to be issued, Tuesday, 3/31/2020, to issue the ballot.

## **Issuing Ballots for the 5/19/2020 Combined General Primary / Nonpartisan General Elections / Presidential Preference Primary.**

Voters that did not participate in the 3/24/2020 PPP, will receive a Combined Ballot (a ballot style that includes both the PPP Ballot choices and the May ballot choices). Only one party may be selected, and all choices on the ballot received by the voter will be of the same party (plus the non-partisan races).

Voters that participated in the PPP that request a ballot for the May election will receive a ballot style that includes all of the races originally scheduled for May but does not include the PPP choices.

- There will be no restriction on party ballot preference for these voters. They may select to receive a Democratic, Republican, or Nonpartisan ballot.
- Rollover voters will continue to receive ballots for the party preference indicated on their original application unless they express a different party preference for the May elections in writing.

Voters that requested an absentee ballot by mail for the 3/24/2020 PPP but have not returned the ballot when they attempt to vote again:

Election Day – The voter will appear in the Poll Pad the same as they would if they had been issued an absentee ballot and not returned the ballot. They will be required to complete an affidavit cancelling their absentee by mail ballot and will be allowed to cast a combined ballot.

Advanced In-Person – The outstanding absentee ballot will be cancelled and the voter will be issued a Combined Ballot at the polling place.

Absentee by Mail - The outstanding absentee ballot will be cancelled and the voter will be issued a combined absentee by mail absentee ballot.

To determine which ballot style (Combined Ballot or May Ballot) Registrars will examine ElectionNet to determine whether or not the voter participated in the PPP.

Outstanding PPP Ballots should only be cancelled if a new request for an absentee ballot is submitted by the voter for the 5/19/2020 election and a Combined Ballot is issued to the voter. PPP Ballots issued before the 3/20/2020 deadline can be accepted up until the new PPP election date of 5/19/2020 (or 5/22/2020 for UOCAVA ballots postmarked by election day).

Absentee ballot envelopes should be identified in a manner that allows ballots issued for the 3/24/2020 election to be distinguished from the 5/19/2020 ballots when they are returned to election offices.

### **UOCAVA Ballots**

All UOCAVA EBD ballots will be issued as combined ballots. When the ballots are returned, the registrar will determine whether the ballot should be duplicated onto a Combined Ballot or a May Ballot.

### **Provisionals**

The provisional period for all ballots, issued under the 3/24/2020 and 5/19/2020 elections, will conclude on 5/22/2020.

**RE: Absentee by Mail Process for the May 19, 2020 Elections**

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Due to the current public health crisis caused by the COVID-19 virus, Secretary Raffensperger has announced absentee ballot applications will be mailed directly to registered voters in active status for the May 19, 2020 general primary election (which now includes the PPP as well for voters who have not yet voted in the PPP). . Additionally, given that the current situation will likely lead to an increase in absentee ballot requests for the May 19 election, the Secretary of State's office has procured the services of an outside mail vendor that you may choose to utilize to package and mail the absentee ballot package. . The State is using HAVA funds to cover the cost of mailing out the absentee ballot applications as well as the cost of mailing out the absentee ballot packages done through the vendor. Counties will still have to handle mailing provisional absentee ballots to voters who are entitled to receive them.

### **Absentee by Mail Process Outline**

- Secretary of State will mail absentee ballot applications to all registered voters in active status. These applications will have a barcode to allow the county elections offices to find the voter's registration quickly. Pending or Inactive voters can also request an absentee ballot application from their County Elections office. An absentee ballot application is also listed on the Secretary of State website.

- The voter will complete the absentee ballot application. The completed application will be mailed, emailed, or faxed to the County Registrar's office in the county where the voter is registered.
- The County Registrar's office will verify the information on the absentee ballot application and ensure the voter's signature matches the recorded signature in the voter registration system.
- The County Registrar's office will enter the absentee ballot application information into the voter registration system.
- Each day, the Secretary of State will generate an absentee voter report from the voter registration system for the mail vendor to issue absentee ballots for the May 19, 2020 elections.

- The mail vendor will receive the absentee voter report and package and mail the absentee ballot package with all the required return envelopes and instructions to the voter.
- The voter will follow the absentee ballot instructions, complete their absentee ballot, and package the absentee ballot in the provided return envelopes.
- The voter will return the absentee ballot to their County Registrar's office.
- The County Registrar's office will check the absentee ballot to determine if the ballot should be accepted or rejected. Voters whose absentee ballot is rejected will be sent a notice and cure affidavit as required by law and SEB rule.
- The County Election offices will secure the ballot until time for tabulation.

### **Processing Absentee Ballot Applications**

- Counties will continue to enter absentee ballot application information into eNet.
- The absentee ballot applications mailed by the State vendor will have a barcode to allow the County Election offices to find the voter's registration quickly.
- Pending or Inactive voters can also request an absentee ballot application from their County Elections office or the Secretary of State office. An absentee ballot application is also listed on the Secretary of State website.
- Counties will verify the information on the absentee ballot application and ensure the voter's signature matches the recorded signature in the voter registration system.
- It is very important that the county reviews the entered application information for accuracy.

### **Issuing of Absentee Ballots**

- After the county has issued the absentee ballot in the absentee ballot module, eNet will generate a report with the absentee ballot packages to be
- The mail vendor will issue/mail the absentee ballots for the May 19, 2020 elections to the voters who have submitted absentee ballot applications.
- The County Elections office will be required to issue absentee ballots for UOCAVA voters who have submitted applications before April 4, 2020 and provisional absentee ballots for mismatch signatures on absentee ballot applications.
- UOCAVA Week (March 31<sup>st</sup> – April 4<sup>th</sup>)
  - Counties will issue absentee ballots by mail for UOCAVA voters who have submitted applications on or before April 4, 2020. Counties will continue to prepare to meet the UOCAVA deadline.
  - Any absentee ballot applications entered in eNet for UOCAVA voters after April 4, 2020 will be issued by the Secretary of State vendor.
  - Electronic Ballot Delivery (EBD) ballots for UOCAVA voters will be issued as normal. Those UOCAVA voters will be able to retrieve their ballot through the Secretary of State My Voter Page (MVP).
- Mismatch Signature on Absentee Ballot Application
  - The county will verify the information on the absentee ballot application and ensure the voter's signature matches the recorded signature in the voter registration system.
    - If the voter's signature on the absentee ballot application does not match, the county will mark the voter's absentee ballot as provisional/challenged and complete the cure affidavit process. The county will issue/mail the absentee ballot to the voter.
- Each day, the Secretary of State will generate an absentee voter report from the voter registration system for the mail vendor to issue absentee ballots for the May 19, 2020 elections.

- Any absentee ballot applications you have already entered will be issued by the mail vendor.
- Absentee ballots for rollover elderly/disabled voters will be issued by the mail vendor.

### **Ordering Paper Ballots**

- Counties will need to order or print the required minimum of 10% of emergency ballots and provisional ballots.
- Counties will need absentee ballots for voters who submit absentee ballot applications with mismatch signatures.

### **Advance in-person Voting**

- Advance in-person voting will begin as scheduled on April 27, 2020.
- Counties will need to continue to plan for advance in-person voting.
- Please continue to notify your Liaison of any closures or issues that may affect advance in-person voting in your county.

### **Frequently Asked Questions**

- On what date will the absentee ballot applications be mailed to the voters in active status?
  - Absentee ballot applications will begin to go out on Monday, March 30<sup>th</sup>.
- On what date will the absentee ballots be issued/mailed by the mail vendor?
  - TBD - We will announce this date as soon as possible.
- What will be the daily cutoff for counties to enter absentee ballot application information into eNet in order for the absentee ballot to be issued/mailed by the mail vendor the next day?
  - The Secretary of State office is working on this process. We will provide more information as soon as possible.
- Will there be an audit report to ensure each absentee ballot was issued by the mail vendor?
  - The Secretary of State office is working on a process to allow each county to verify the absentee ballot issued to their voters. We will announce this process as soon as possible.
- How will we identify the ballots issued/mailed by the mail vendor in eNet?
  - The Secretary of State office plans to develop an exception in eNet.
- How will the mail vendor know to issue a voter a May only ballot versus a combined ballot?
  - The mail vendor will review the absentee ballot information from eNet to determine which ballot type to send to each voter.

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### State Issued Absentee by Mail Process

#### Summary

Due to the health concerns caused by the COVID-19 virus, the Secretary of State has moved the Presidential Primary, General Primary, and Nonpartisan General Election to June 9, 2020. The absentee process that was planned for the 5/19/2020 election will remain in place for the new election date. The new election date comes with new legal restrictions. Per O.C.G.A. 21-2-384 (a)(2), absentee ballot may not be mailed out more than 49 days before an election. All counties should hold off on issuing any additional absentee ballots until this new 49-day period begins on April 21, 2020. The state hired absentee ballot vendor will also be instructed to wait until this time to issue ballots on behalf of the counties.

#### Absentee Process Overview

The Office of the Secretary of State sent out absentee ballot applications to all active registered voters in Georgia. Additionally, our office will be promoting the use of absentee ballots by mail as an alternative to in-person voting. To assist with the increased burden placed on the counties by this shift from in-person to absentee by mail, the Secretary of State has procured a mail vendor to send ballot packets to voters on behalf of the counties. County registrars will still be responsible for accepting absentee ballot applications, verifying the information and signature of the voters, and entering voter information into the Absentee Module of the Voter Registration System. Once the information has been entered into the system, the state will export reports that contain voter information and instruct the mail vendor to print and issue ballots to voters. Voters will complete their ballots and return them to their county registration offices. County employees will enter returned ballot information into the voter registration system to apply credit for voting and retain the ballots until Election Day for tabulation.

## **Process Details**

Absentee ballot applications will be completed by the voters and sent into county registration offices. Once they are received, the county registrars will:

1. Date stamp the absentee ballot application
2. Verify the voter information and compare the signature on the application to ensure it matches the signature on file for the voter
3. Enter the absentee ballot application into the Voter Registration System (ElectionNet)
  - a. The Date Requested in the Ballot Requested Information section should reflect the date the application was received by the county registration office
  - b. The Issue/Mailed Date in the Ballot Issued Information section should be 4/21/2020 until 4/21/2020 has passed. After that time the Issued/Mailed date should reflect the date that the application was entered into ElectionNet.
  - c. The system will default to include the mailing address in the Ballot Issued information section. The ballot packet will be sent to the address displayed here.
    - i. If the voter does not have a mailing address, the residential address will display by default
    - ii. If the voter has indicated on their application that they would like to receive their ballot at a different address, this information should be entered into the absentee module in the Ballot Issued Information section

The state vendor will then mail the absentee ballot packets to the addresses in the Ballot Issued Information section of the Absentee entry for the 6/9/2020 election.

## **Exceptions**

The purpose of procuring the mail vendor is to assist the counties as much as possible given the increased use in absentee ballots for this election. However, there are special circumstances that will prevent the mail vendor from being able to issue ballots to the following types of absentee voters:

- Challenged Voters
  - Examples include voters that are currently on the felon 40 day clock.
- Provisional Voters
  - Examples include voters with a signature mismatch between their absentee ballot application and the signature on file with the registration office that require a cure affidavit.
- Missing Identification Voters (Often referred to as MIDR or IDR voters)
- UOCAVA Voters that have requested absentee ballots by mail

Absentee ballot packets for voters in the groups listed above will need to be prepared and mailed to voters by the county registration offices. Enter an issue date for these records that reflects the date that the absentee ballot was mailed by your office. We will periodically provide reports that include voters in these groups to the county offices to ensure that all ballots are being sent out.

## **Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)**

Q: Will voters need to submit a new absentee ballot application now that the election date has been moved?

Page 2 of 4

A: No, all applications for the 5/19/2020 election will be honored as applications for the 6/9/2020 election.

Q: Will counties receive new ballots with the updated 6/9/2020 election date on them? What should be done with the ballots that have already ordered or received from my absentee ballot printer?

A: No, the ballots will not be updated from their current form to show the new election date of 6/9/2020. All of the ballots already ordered can still be used for the 6/9/2020 election. All of the ballots sent out should be counted if they are returned.

Q: Should county registrars continue to issue ballots for the 6/9/2020 election?

A: County registrars should continue to process absentee ballot applications as they come in, but ballot packages should not be mailed until the absentee period begins again on 4/21/2020. The mail vendor will also hold off on issuing ballots until 4/21/2020.

Q: Should county registrars continue to enter absentee ballot applications into ElectionNet? What issue/mailed date should they enter?

A: Yes, registrars should continue to enter absentee ballot applications into ElectionNet. County registrars should enter the issued/mailed date of 4/21/2020 up until 4/21/2020. After this date, registrars should enter the current date as the issue date when entering absentee ballot applications into ElectionNet.

Q: Will county registrars need to update the issue dates of all of the voters in the voter registration system to reflect the new 4/21/2020 issue date?

A: No, the Office of the Secretary of State will update the issue dates of the absentee ballots it intends to send out to the new 4/21/2020 date. County registrars will be responsible for updating the issue dates of the exception ballots that are required to be mailed out by the county.

Q: Should registrars cancel outstanding absentee ballots for the 3/24/2020 election if they receive a new application for the 6/9/2020 election?

A: Yes, when you receive an application for the 6/9/2020 election, outstanding ballots for the 3/24/2020 election should be cancelled. The vendor will issue a combined ballot to all voters who have not returned their 3/24/2020 ballot. This will be done based on the credit for voting file, so it is important to make sure that you check in all returned 3/24/2020 ballots.

Q: If a 3/24/2020 ballot is received back in the voter registration office, should it be counted.

A: That depends on the circumstances. If the voter has not applied for and been issued a 6/9/2020 combined ballot, yes, 3/24/2020 ballots can still be accepted. If the voter has applied for a 6/9/2020 ballot and been issued a combined 6/9/2020 ballot, the 3/24/2020 ballot should be rejected to prevent double voting in the 3/24/2020 elections.

Q: Will absentee ballot packets be sent to the mailing addresses of voters?

A: Absentee ballot packets will be sent to the addresses entered into the Ballot Issued Information section of ElectionNet. The system defaults to the mailing address. If there is no mailing address on file for a voter, the system defaults to the residential address on file for the voter. The address in the Ballot Issued Information section can also be updated to a different address other than the residential or mailing address of the voter. The address that is input into the Ballot Issued Information section will be the address the ballot packet is sent to.

Q: Will absentee ballot packets that are undelivered be returned to the county registration office?

A: No, the ballot packets that are undeliverable will be returned to the SOS office. These ballot packets will then be forwarded to the county registration offices by the SOS office.

Q: If a voter wants to change the party ballot that they requested, how should this be handled in the system to ensure the voter gets a new ballot?

A: The existing entry for the 6/9/2020 election should be cancelled in the system with the cancellation reason of Voter Requested. A new absentee ballot entry should be entered into the system with the date that the change was entered into the system as the Issue/Mailed date. This is how all ballots should that need to be reissued should be handled, including cancelled, spoiled, and rejected ballots. The reason code that is selected should reflect the circumstances. If a new entry is entered into the system with the current date as the issued date, a new absentee ballot will be sent out by the vendor.

  - Purpose of call is to address the election community and allow a forum to voice concerns the election officials are facing while preparing for their upcoming primaries and the November general election.

**Discussion:**

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- CDC Team provided COVID-19 status updates, guidance, and took Q&A as follows:
- Highlights:
  - For polling places, must maintain hand hygiene practices, social distancing, and care with the number of voters and poll workers at sites in same timeframe to avoid crowding.
  - Reminded all that CDC has election specific information, to include for polling locations, available online at <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/index.html>.
  - Stated they don't believe that licking of envelopes is of great transmission concern to election workers processing them but think we should continue to look into alternate methods of wetting seals at voter end and opening. Practice frequent hand hygiene with handling envelopes if concerned.
- Comments:
  - On question of asymptomatic voters/poll workers and how to handle-they reinforced hygiene and social distancing, just in case, until more is known.
  - Polling pads and stylus protocols – CDC not familiar in detail with this technology but reinforced periodic cleaning/disinfection with appropriate solutions (check with manufacturer or consider alcohol solutions with at least 70% alcohol) and distancing during voting.

**Election Infrastructure Subsector  
Initial CDC and USPS Election Partner Teleconference  
Abbreviated Summary**

- Community Intervention Task Force help develops voting and defense section guidance.
  - Guidance for cleaning and disinfecting polling places is on the CDC website.
  - Managing lines, try to keep 6 feet in between people, managing the interaction between poll workers and the public, and people that would be coming in to vote is important.
  - Making sure that you have products on hand, like alcohol-based hand sanitizer, and handwashing stations for people to be able to keep themselves safe.
  - Also understanding that many people that work in polling places are members of the high-risk category.
  - Limiting the number of people, like kids or others, that can come in with voters.
  - Adding communicative messages and posters around election offices and polling places that reinforce social hygiene, etc.
- CDC Q&A:
  - Q1. Whether CDC has taken a formal position, or plan to take some form of public guidance on Vote by Mail (VBM) and specifically around the licking of envelopes and the transmission of COVID? Is this something we should be worried about?
  - A1. CDC does not believe that licking the envelopes is of great concern. However, there are alternative ways in which to moisten the envelopes. So, if you are at all concerned about people who have licked envelopes, advise people to do it differently and promote hand hygiene. In terms of our recognizing moving to VBM, any opportunity that you have to keep people out of areas where they are going to congregate putting either themselves or others at risk, is good. At the same time, we also want to make sure that people have the opportunity to vote, and that nothing is put in place that would then prevent people, who would normally be able to vote, from voting. This is a state or local decision, to be discussed at that level so that appropriate ability to vote is maintained.
  - Q2. Thoughts on asymptomatic patients and guidance or advice around people who may not actually feel ill but may; any possible ways to either educate or protect against the spread of the virus recognizing this factor.
  - A2. Still one of the main questions that we are trying to understand. I think that people across the world dealing with this pandemic are trying to understand. I think that any of the infection control practices that we put into place other than particularly around cleaning, other than the ones that say stay at home if you are symptomatic would be applicable here. So just making

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sure that you are maintaining appropriate distance, you are cleaning and disinfecting high-touch surfaces, all of those practices are important, regardless of whether you actively know someone is sick or not in your polling place.

- Q3. Thomas County in Kansas. For those of us that use poll pads for the voter to sign in, we have a stylus at each poll pad, do you have recommendations on not using those. Or just wiping those down after each use?
- A3. [CDC speaker reiterated that they were not election equipment experts.] Generally, it is a great idea to try and wipe those down after each transaction or as often as feasible. Especially when people are handling them. Again, you have to be a little careful about electronics and what types of disinfectants you can use to not damage them. A lot of times you can get information for that from the device manufacturer. But again, going back to my original comment, one of the most important work things is just hand hygiene. So not just for the poll workers, but for the public after they drop off their ballots, or vote, or whatever, to clean their hands with soap and water or sanitizer.
- Q4. Does CDC have a general projection for the sort of curve for the virus and if or when we might reach the highpoint? Recognizing that there are primary elections happening throughout April, May, and June but also for preparation for the November elections? Your scientific projection of the current state of things and out to November?
- A4. CDC deferred on answering that question as it can't be effectively answered yet. CDC understands the degree of anxiety that COVID-19 is imposing. Whatever preparations you can make to think about the pandemic extending, certainly the next few months, will be helpful.
- Q5. Amy Cohen, NASED. You mentioned that you don't think that licking envelopes would be a means of transmission but what about on paper in general?
- A5. CDC feels it comes back to hand hygiene. We do not view paper as a massive transmission route in this setting. CDC not telling national libraries to disinfect their books and things like that. So not really worried about someone handing paper to you. Again, the actionable thing that can be done is providing good hand sanitizing materials for the people to disinfect with.
- Q6. Kristen Sabrowsky-Siskin, Rocklin County, NY. You talked a little about the poll pads. I don't foresee how we can use those poll pads and not have the inspectors and voters within a six-foot radius. They both have to interact with the poll pads.

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- A6. [CDC speaker reiterated that they were not election equipment experts.] Try to think creatively about how you could set up that distance so that it would work. The other option is it might make sense to figure out what an alternative might be? Also, really the concern around transmission from people close to each other is really about extended amounts of time. So, if you can have task separation, that can be helpful as well.
  - Q7. Leslie Reynolds, NASS. It sounds like to me, people are asking about the poll pads, and stylus because they are going to be touched, with every transaction. But it sounds like you are more concerned with people coming into close contact with one another than on surfaces? The poll pad would be similar to using an ATM machine if you are touching the screen. You have to wipe it down every single time someone uses it. Or are you more concerned about the person-to-person interaction?
  - A7. Great point. Social distancing is really separate but equal in terms of their interaction, surface cleaning helps with any shared transmission through shared objects. With all of it, from a voting experience, separating as much as possible and practicing hygiene. Setting up strategic stations, where they could sanitize their hands after touching an object, etc. maybe as they come and leave. It could be easily managed through a system, it is just an issue of dealing with the volume of people that are coming through to vote.
- USPS Election Mail Program Manager, Mr. Dan Bentley provided thoughts as follows:
    - Highlights:
      - Asked Election Officials to stay coordinated with his Election Mail Area Leads and Coordinators, especially with Vote By Mail (VBM) transitions.
      - Also, work closely with USPS mail piece design experts to ensure compatibility with USPS automation processes.
      - Was asked by Iowa Secretary of State Pate about lowering postal rates to non-profit level. He will take that back to HQ for discussion.
    - Comments:
      - Dan Bentley, Election Mail Program Manager, USPS. Thank you for inviting me today and thank you to the CDC for their diligent effort to keep us informed in an evolving situation.
      - Postal Service to Election Official outreach efforts:
        - Election Mail District Coordinators outreach to Boards of Election is ongoing, focusing on states with upcoming primaries. We've started our second outreach pass for states that have already had primaries.

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- State Election Executives, as you scale up vote by mail efforts in response to COVID-19 please contact your designated Area Lead to discuss your plans. The list of Area Leads and District Level Coordinators was shared on Monday with the EAC, NASS, and NASED
  - We are coordinating with printers, EAC, NASS, and NASED.
  - We are ready and available to support you on a state and local level.
  - We have Election Mail preparation and mailing education information online [usps.com/electionmail](https://usps.com/electionmail).
  - Prepaid return mail postage options:
    - Please contact your Postal Service Area Lead to discuss.
    - Note: Legislative action and funding may be required in your state.
  - Ballot envelope design verification:
    - Please have every election mail envelope design reviewed and approved by a USPS Mailpiece Design Analyst.
- USPS Q&A - Dan Bentley:
    - Q1. Any concerns about the impact of the virus on the USPS workforce, and the increase in the VBM activity and the ability to hand that?
    - A1. Both very good questions.
      - We are taking steps to minimize the effects. Everything that was discussed on this call is being implemented throughout the USPS.
      - We are capable of handling and scaling for increased volume. My concern is not the volume. We want to make sure that every mail piece is going to comply with our mailing standards and is automation-compatible.
    - Q2. Question on delivery of ballots and absentee applications. Any advice you can give us that would help us minimize that because we have a significant delay on everything being dumped into the system on the same day. Is there any kind of advice that the USPS would give as far as breaking that into multiple days when we mail out all the absentee applications/ballots?
    - A2. Please work with your Area Lead and District Coordinator so they can ensure that they have the appropriate staffing levels when the mail is inducted.
    - Q3. Iowa Secretary of State Paul Pate. Any chance to get the rate lowered to non-profit level, or some kind of reduction at least? I know we have asked you in the past couple days, or let the feds figure out how to pay it, some of these mail costs. But is there at least an opportunity to get the rate reduced to the non-profit level?
    - A3. The Postal Service's prices for Market Dominant products, including First Class Mail, Marketing Mail, and Nonprofit Marketing Mail, are subject to statutory and regulatory pricing rules. The prices for these products are set in advance, are subject

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to a variety of requirements (including a strict price cap) and cannot change without prior review by the Postal Regulatory Commission. Election Mail is not a separate rate category and is instead subject to the established rates for the class of mail for which postage has been paid. As a result, the Postal Service cannot unilaterally set “lower” rates for Election Mail.

- Election officials may send Election Mail at the established Marketing Mail or Nonprofit Marketing Mail rates, to the extent permitted by state and Federal law. However, they should be aware that this class of mail has a slower delivery standard than First Class Mail.
  - Q4. Saint Louis Park, MN. Is there any reason to be concerned about the possible bankruptcy of USPS? Impacts? Maybe increasing delivery times? I know this has been discussed in the media.
  - A4. The Postal Service is working through the COVID-19 event. We are focused on protecting our employees, our customers, and the mail. We are adjusting our operations as needed to meet the changing circumstances of the event. Any service disruptions will be posted to our USPS Service Alerts website found at <https://about.usps.com/newsroom/service-alerts/>.
  - Q5. Steve Raborn, Registrar of Voters, East Baton Rouge Parish, LA. We are hearing that the USPS is not delivering mail to retirement communities, and I am hearing that is problematic for others as well. Have you given direction to postal carriers regarding delivery to these types of communities?
  - A5. The Postal Service is working with retirement communities, nursing homes, and others to ensure there is no disruption to their service while protecting the employees, the customers, and the mail. More information is available at <https://about.usps.com/newsroom/service-alerts/>.
  - Q6. Thomas County, KS. We have the same issue as Baton Rouge except that ours is ballots being mailed out to colleges and universities. They are not being delivered.
  - A6. Most colleges and universities manage their own mail operation. Forwarding to students not on campus would be done by them.
