This is in further response to your November 19, 2020 Freedom of Information Act request seeking access to records pertaining to “all text messages and attachments (including on messaging platforms such as WhatsApp or Signal), between (1) any of the agency officials: Assistant Attorney General Eric Dreiband; Anyone serving as Deputy Assistant Attorney General supervising the Voting Section; Anyone serving as Voting Section Chief and (2) anyone communicating from specified outside individuals: Senator Lindsey Graham; Richard Perry, Chief of Staff to Senator Lindsey Graham; Alice James, Press Secretary/Scheduler to Senator Lindsey Graham; Matt Rinkunas, Deputy Chief of Staff for Senator Lindsey Graham; Kevin Bishop, Communications Director for Senator Lindsey Graham; Scott Graber, Counsel for Senator Lindsey Graham; Scott Farmer, Campaign Manager for Senator Lindsey Graham; Thomas W. Arrighi, Communications Director; Mary Hollis McGreevy, Scheduler.”

If you submit your appeal by mail, both the letter and the envelope should be clearly marked "Freedom of Information Act Appeal."
