Dear Ms. Sloan:

This responds to your three separate Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests all dated September 30, 2019 and all addressed to the Department of State (DOS) Office of Inspector General (OIG). You have requested:

- (1) "all whistleblower complaints submitted to the State Inspector General containing allegations that concern the conduct of Secretary Mike Pompeo."
- (2) "records sufficient to identify how many whistleblower complaints were submitted to the State Inspector General containing allegations that concern the conduct of Mike Pompeo."
- (3) "all email communications (email messages, email attachments, calendar invitations, and attachments thereto) sent or received by Inspector General Steve Linick regarding any potential or submitted whistleblower complaints involving allegations that concern the conduct of Secretary Mike Pompeo."

Your requests were received in this office on October 3, 2019. Your requests were given the FOIA Case numbers of 2019-109, 2019-110, and 2019-111, respectively.

FOIA 2019-109:

Please find attached the responsive record released to you previously as our final response to this request. We have exercised our discretion to remove the redaction from any direct reference to the Secretary per your correspondence with DOJ counsel.

Further, while reviewing the potentially responsive records for Case Number 2019-111, we determined it would be appropriate to supplement our search by also searching, Office of Investigations, Hotline Complaints. During this supplemental search, we identified 3 additional records (8 pages) responsive to your request. We have reviewed 2 of these responsive records under FOIA to determine whether they may be disclosed to you. Based on that review, this office is providing the following supplemental final response:

2 page(s) are released in full;

2 page(s) are released in part.

We are currently reviewing the final responsive record under FOIA to determine whether it may be disclosed to you and will provide you a response as expeditiously as possible.

OIG redacted from the enclosed documents, names and identifying information of third parties to protect the identities of these individuals. Absent a Privacy Act waiver, the release of such information concerning the third parties named in these records would result in an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy in violation of the Privacy Act. Information is also protected from disclosure pursuant to (b)(6) of the FOIA further discussed below.

Exemption 6, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6)

Exemption 6 allows withholding of "personnel and medical files and *similar files* the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy." 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6) (emphasis added). DOS-OIG is invoking Exemption 6 to the names of lower level investigative staff, third parties, subjects and any information that could reasonably be expected to identify such individuals.

FOIA 2019-110:

As per your previous discussion with DOJ counsel, we consider this request to be subsumed in our FOIA Case 2019-109. Thus, the supplement to our response to FOIA 2019-109 is applicable to this request as well.

FOIA 2019-111:

In response to your request (FOIA Case 2019-111), we conducted a search/searches of the OIG's Office(s) Front Office (which DOJ counsel has previously explained to you includes the classified email system). The search identified 236 potentially responsive records. We completed processing all of these records and identified no records responsive to your request.

Additionally, in response to this request we conducted a search/searches of the OIG's Office(s) of Investigations, Evaluation and Special Projects Office of Investigations, Office of General Counsel, and the Front Office (which DOJ counsel has previously explained to you is an unclassified email account). We processed approximately 1,800 potentially responsive records and identified 2 records (5 pages) responsive to your request. We reviewed the responsive records under the FOIA to determine whether they may be disclosed to you. Based on that review, this office is providing the following interim response:

4 page(s) are released in part.

1 page(s) are withheld in full.

OIG redacted from the enclosed documents, names and identifying information of third parties to protect the identities of these individuals. Absent a Privacy Act waiver, the release of such information concerning the third parties named in these records would result in an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy in violation of the Privacy Act. Information is also protected from disclosure pursuant to Exemption b(3), (b)(5), (b)(6), and b(7) of the FOIA.

Exemption 3, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6)

Exemption 3 of the FOIA protects information exempted from release by statute.

Exemption 5, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(5)

Exemption 5 of the FOIA protects "inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency." 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(5). DOS-OIG is invoking the deliberative process privilege of Exemption 5 to protect information that falls within that privilege's domain.

Exemption 6, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6)

Exemption 6 allows withholding of "personnel and medical files and *similar files* the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy." 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6) (emphasis added). DOS-OIG is invoking Exemption 6 to the names of lower level investigative staff, third parties, subjects and any information that could reasonably be expected to identify such individuals.

Exemption 7(A), 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(7)(A)

Exemption 7(A) authorizes the withholding of "records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes . . . to the extent that production of such law enforcement records or information . . . could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings." 5 U.S.C. § 552 (b)(7)(A). DOS-OIG is invoking Exemption 7(A) to protect information pertaining to ongoing investigations including ongoing proceedings.

DOS-OIG may also assert other to be determined Exemptions for this information. Although other exemptions may be applicable to this information, DOS-OIG is not in a position to assert other exemptions at this time since these matters are still pending. An enclosure to this letter provides a brief explanation for additional exemptions that may be present.

Exemption 7(C), 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(7)(C)

Exemption 7(C) protects from public disclosure “records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes . . . [if disclosure] could reasonably be expected to cause an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.” 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(7)(C). DOS-OIG is invoking Exemption 7(C) to protect the names of lower level investigative staff, third parties, subjects and any information contained in these investigative records that could reasonably be expected to identify those individuals.

Appeal

FOR REQUESTS IN LITIGATION:

Although I am aware that your request is the subject of ongoing litigation and appeals are not ordinarily acted on in such situations, I am required by statute and regulation to inform you of your right to file an administrative appeal.¹ If you choose to file an administrative appeal it must be received within 90 days of the date of this response. ¹ For your information, Congress excluded three discrete categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIA. 5 U.S.C. 552(c) (2006 & Supp. IV 2010). This response is limited to those records that are subject to the requirements of the FOIA. This is a standard notification that is given to all our requesters and should not be taken as an indication that excluded records do, or do not, exist.
