This email is the final response of the Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR) to Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) No. FY20-55 submitted on January 8, 2020 requesting emails and records of meetings between CJ Mahoney and the following organizations between March 18, 2018 and January 9, 2020, the date the search was conducted: Dobson Family Institute, Home School Legal Defense Association, Heritage, Family Research Council, Alliance Defending Freedom, First Liberty, Family Watch International, or Patrick Henry College.

After a search of our files, we have located 15 pages of responsive documents which we are releasing in part. We redacted non-public contact information because we reasonably foresee that disclosure would harm an interest protected by FOIA Exemption 6, which protects personal information the release of which would not shed light on the performance of the agency's statutory duties.

This constitutes a complete response to your request. Your appeal must be postmarked or electronically transmitted within 90 days of the date of the response to your request. Heightened security in force may delay mail delivery; therefore we suggest that you also email any such appeal to foia@ustr.eop.gov.

In the event you are dissatisfied with the results of any such appeal, judicial review will thereafter be available to you in the United States District Court for the judicial district in which you reside or have your principal place of business, or in the District of Columbia, where we searched for the records you requested.

Dear FOIA Officer:

Pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), 5 U.S.C. § 552, and the implementing regulations of your agency, American Oversight makes the following request for records.

President Trump recently nominated Deputy U.S. Trade Representative C.J. Mahoney to be the State Department's Legal Advisor, as the State Department navigates critical legal issues related to the impeachment inquiry and rising tensions with Iran. ^[1][1]

American Oversight seeks records to shed light on Ambassador Mahoney's influences and priorities during his time at the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR).

Requested Records

American Oversight requests that the USTR produce the following records as soon as practicable, and at least within twenty business days:

1. All email communications (including email messages, calendar invitations, and attachments thereto, and including complete email chains) between Deputy USTR C.J. Mahoney and the individuals or entities specified below:
 1. Anyone communicating on behalf of Dobson Family Institute (JDFI), including Jenna Ellis and anyone with an email address ending in dobsonfamilyinstitute.com
 2. Anyone communicating on behalf of Home School Legal Defense Association (HSLDA), including Michael Donnelly and anyone with an email address ending in hsllda.org
 3. Emilie Kao, including from an email address ending in heritage.org
 4. Anyone communicating on behalf of Family Research Council (FRC), including Mary Beth Waddell and anyone with an email address ending in frc.org
 5. Anyone communicating on behalf of Alliance Defending Freedom (ADF), including Kellie Fiedorek and anyone with an email address ending in adflegal.org
 6. Anyone communicating on behalf of First Liberty, including Ken Klukowski and anyone with an email address ending in firstliberty.org
 7. Anyone communicating on behalf of Family Watch International, including Sharon Slater (including at her email address ending in gmail.com) and anyone with an email address ending in familywatch.org
 8. Anyone communicating on behalf of Patrick Henry College, including Stephen Baskerville and anyone with an email address ending in phc.edu
2. All records reflecting the content of any meetings (e.g., meeting agendas, attendee lists, notes from meetings, handwritten or electronic summaries, and any materials exchanged during meetings) between Deputy USTR C.J. Mahoney and any of the individuals or entities specified above.

Please provide all responsive records from March 18, 2018, through the date the search is conducted.

Fee Waiver Request

In accordance with 5 U.S.C. § 552(a)(4)(A)(iii) and your agency's regulations, American Oversight requests a waiver of fees associated with processing this request for records. The subject of this request concerns the operations of the federal government, and the disclosures will likely contribute to a better understanding of relevant government procedures by the general public in a significant way. Moreover, the request is primarily and fundamentally for non-commercial purposes.

American Oversight requests a waiver of fees because disclosure of the requested information is "in the public interest because it is likely to contribute significantly to public understanding of operations or activities of the government."^[2]^[2] In light of Ambassador Mahoney's nomination to be State Legal Advisor during an especially controversial time for the Department, it is important for the public to be informed of his prior record in a leadership position at USTR, including his official activities and communications with individuals who may be attempting to influence USTR policy. The subject of this request is a matter of public interest, and the public's understanding of the government's activities and use of resources would be enhanced through American Oversight's analysis and publication of these records.

This request is primarily and fundamentally for non-commercial purposes.^[3]^[3] As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, American Oversight does not have a commercial purpose and the release of the information requested is not in American Oversight's financial interest. American Oversight's mission is to promote transparency in government, to educate the public about government activities, and to ensure the accountability of government officials. American Oversight uses the information gathered, and its analysis of it, to educate the public through reports, press releases, or other media. American Oversight also makes materials it gathers available on its public website and promotes their availability on social media platforms, such as Facebook and Twitter.^[4]^[4]

American Oversight has also demonstrated its commitment to the public disclosure of documents and creation of editorial content through numerous substantive analyses posted to its website.^[5]^[5] Examples reflecting this commitment to the public disclosure of documents and the creation of editorial content include the posting of records related to an ethics waiver received by a senior Department of Justice attorney and an analysis of what those records demonstrated regarding the Department's process for issuing such waivers;^[6]^[6] posting records received as part of American Oversight's "Audit the Wall" project to gather and analyze information related to the administration's proposed construction of a barrier along the U.S.-Mexico border, and analyses of what those records reveal;^[7]^[7] posting records regarding potential self-dealing at the Department of Housing & Urban Development and related analysis;^[8]^[8] posting records and analysis relating to the federal government's efforts to sell nuclear technology to Saudi Arabia;^[9]^[9] posting records and analysis regarding the Department of Justice's decision in response to demands from Congress to direct a U.S. Attorney to undertake a wide-ranging review and make recommendations regarding criminal investigations relating to the President's political opponents and allegations of misconduct by the Department of Justice itself and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.^[10]^[10]

Accordingly, American Oversight qualifies for a fee waiver.

Guidance Regarding the Search & Processing of Requested Records

In connection with its request for records, American Oversight provides the following guidance regarding the scope of the records sought and the search and processing of records:

- Our request for records includes any attachments to those records or other materials enclosed with those records when they were previously transmitted. To the extent that an email is responsive to our request, our request includes all prior messages sent or received in that email chain, as well as any attachments to the email.
- Please search all relevant records or systems containing records regarding agency business. Do not exclude records regarding agency business contained in files, email accounts, or devices in the personal custody of your officials, such as personal email accounts or text messages. Records of official business conducted using unofficial systems or stored outside of official files are subject to the Federal Records Act and FOIA.^[11]^[11] It is not adequate to rely on policies and procedures that require officials to move such information to official systems within a certain period of time; American Oversight has a right to records contained in those files even if material has not yet been moved to official systems or if officials have, by intent or through negligence, failed to meet their obligations.^[12]^[12]
- Please use all tools available to your agency to conduct a complete and efficient search for potentially responsive records. Agencies are subject to government-wide requirements to manage agency information electronically,^[13]^[13] and many agencies have adopted the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) Capstone program, or similar policies. These systems provide options for searching emails and other

electronic records in a manner that is reasonably likely to be more complete than just searching individual custodian files. For example, a custodian may have deleted a responsive email from his or her email program, but your agency's archiving tools may capture that email under Capstone. At the same time, custodian searches are still necessary; agencies may not have direct access to files stored in .PST files, outside of network drives, in paper format, or in personal email accounts.

- In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the requested records. If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically why it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.
- Please take appropriate steps to ensure that records responsive to this request are not deleted by the agency before the completion of processing for this request. If records potentially responsive to this request are likely to be located on systems where they are subject to potential deletion, including on a scheduled basis, please take steps to prevent that deletion, including, as appropriate, by instituting a litigation hold on those records.

Conclusion

STATEMENT

Today, Heritage analysts delivered a comprehensive assessment of the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement in anticipation of the agreement's forthcoming implementing legislation. [James Carafano](#), Vice President of the Institute for Foreign Policy and National Security, and [Jack Spencer](#), Vice President of the Institute for Economic Freedom, released the following remarks:

“The USMCA affirms America’s commitment to the innovations and modernizations that make businesses competitive, create jobs and offer more consumer choice. America should be the leader in preserving North America’s place as a top region for trade.

“For over 25 years, NAFTA established tariff-free treatment for scores of goods and services and the USMCA continues many of these existing protections. The agreement also brings much needed modernizations for the 21st Century.

“The benefits of free trade found in the USMCA must not be undermined in the implementing legislation. Of key concern are the chapters regarding labor and the environment. A worsening of these aspects in the USMCA would be unacceptable. As the legislation is being finalized by the administration, we would like to see the U.S. strengthen its commitment to free trade.”

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TALKING POINTS

Free and open trade puts American businesses, families and workers first.

A North American trade agreement must instill the values of free trade that ultimately reduce the costs of both imports and exports.

USMCA continues tariff-free treatment for scores of goods and services established under NAFTA, and makes modest gains to dairy market access.

- NAFTA allowed American businesses to develop efficient supply chains, especially in the automotive industry, that make North America one of the most competitive regions for manufactured goods.
- NAFTA increased access to imports from Canada and Mexico, lowering the overall costs for American families and businesses.
- The U.S. economy has added more than 29 million jobs since 1994.

USMCA brings North American trade into the 21st Century with much needed modernizations.

- Agreement creates framework of minimum standards to protect and enforce intellectual property rights.
- Digital trade chapter bans data localization and the forced transfer of source code.
- Information technology improvements within customs processes to facilitate trade and reduce wait times.

As the implementing legislation is being finalized by the administration, we would like to see the U.S. commitment to free trade strengthened.

- Rules of origin requirements and environmental provisions add more regulatory burdens to businesses, and could increase the cost of doing business.
- Trade agreements should not pursue social policy agendas. The references to sexual orientation and gender identity should be removed from the USMCA.
- Shortfalls in USMCA should be addressed in forthcoming implementing legislation or through additional side letters, a worsening of these aspects would be unacceptable.
