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You also submitted this request to the USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS). Accordingly, FSIS is processing the portion of your request pertaining to custodian Paul Kiecker.

Your request is being processed under the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552.

An electronic search for responsive records was conducted by the Client Experience Center's (CEC) eComply team. The CEC provides comprehensive, fee-for-service information technology (IT) associated operations, security, and technical support services to USDA end users. The CEC also implements and manages enterprise IT solutions for users Department-wide. For this **first interim response**, the CEC searched the email accounts associated with the custodians mentioned in your request for the time period from August 1, 2020 through January 20, 2021. The CEC search located records responsive to your FOIA request. For this **first interim response**, the FOIA Division reviewed a total of fifty-nine (59) pages of emails.

The FOIA Division continues to process your request.

Following a review of the responsive records, the FOIA Division has determined that certain information contained therein should be withheld pursuant to U.S.C. § 552(b)(5) and (b)(6) (FOIA Exemptions 5 and 6). Additionally, two (2) pages of records, as well as three (3) spreadsheets, have been withheld in their entirety under FOIA Exemption 5. Below is an explanation of the information that has been withheld.

FOIA Exemption 5 - Deliberative

FOIA Exemption 5 protects from disclosure those "inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency." One of the frequently invoked FOIA Exemption 5 privileges is the deliberative process privilege. To fall within FOIA's deliberative process privilege, the records must be both pre-decisional and deliberative; the records must precede the adoption of an agency policy and include the opinions, recommendations, or deliberations on a legal or policy matter.

In this instance, the FOIA Division is withholding, under the deliberative process privilege, pre-decisional intra-agency discussions and briefings on agency actions and programs on issues relating to proposed legislation and regulations.

These items are pre-decisional in that they are antecedent to any final agency decision. These items are also deliberative in that they reflect the evolving, back-and-forth process between agency employees that is so integral to the Executive Branch decision-making process; more specifically, the development of potential recommendations made by agency advisors for use in making policy decisions.

If these pre-decisional, deliberative communications were released to the public, USDA and other Executive Branch employees would be much more cautious in their discussions with each other, and in candidly discussing and providing all pertinent information and viewpoints in a timely manner to agency decision-makers. This lack of candor would also seriously impair the

Department's ability to engage in forthright, internal discussions necessary for efficient and proper agency decision-making.

FOIA Exemption 5 – Attorney-Client

The FOIA Division is also withholding information under the attorney-client privilege. This privilege protects confidential communication between an attorney and his/her client relating to a legal matter for which the client has sought professional advice. Although this privilege fundamentally applies to facts divulged by a client to his/her attorney, this privilege also encompasses any opinion given by an attorney to his/her client based upon those facts, as well as communications between attorneys that reflect client supplied information.

In this instance, the FOIA Division is withholding information shared internally whereby legal advice is being sought from and provided by the Department's counsel.

These confidential communications are shielded from disclosure in order to encourage open and frank discussions between the Department and its legal advisors. Ensuring the Department receives sound legal advice promotes public policy, and this advice depends on counsel being fully informed. The release of these confidential communications would inhibit the Department's ability to provide pertinent information and would impair the Department's counsel from making well-informed legal decisions.

FOIA Exemption 6

Exemption 6 generally is referred to as the "personal privacy" exemption. It provides that the disclosure requirements of FOIA do not apply to "personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy." Application of the exemption involves balancing the public's interest in disclosure against individuals' privacy interests.

The information withheld under Exemption 6 consists of mobile phone numbers, direct phone numbers for third parties, and personal email addresses. This information qualifies as "similar files" because it is information in which individuals have a privacy interest. Moreover, releasing the information could subject the individuals to unwarranted or unsolicited communications. Because there is a viable privacy interest that would be threatened by disclosure, Exemption 6 authorizes this office to withhold the information. Accordingly, we have determined that the public interest in the information's release does not outweigh the overriding privacy interests in keeping it confidential.

You have the right to appeal the FOIA Division's determinations. Due to the need to issue more than one determination in order to fully resolve your request, your appeal rights for all determinations in response to this request will be provided to you in our final response letter.

FY2021 Omnibus and COVID-19 Relief
Summary**

USDA FY21 Topline Discretionary Funding Comparison:

FY 2021 Conference Agreement Discretionary Funding: \$23.39 billion

FY 2020 Enacted Discretionary Funding: \$21.7 billion

FY 2021 President's Budget Request: \$18.1 billion

FY21 Regular Appropriations Priorities:

USDA-Wide

- **Pay, Awards, FERS:** The budget requests funding for partial annualization of the FY 2020 pay increase of \$22 million and a one percent pay cost increase for calendar year 2021 of \$26 million. Additionally, funds are requested for awards of \$34.7 million and an estimated 1.3 percent FERS increase of \$43.95 million.

Status: Fully Funded.

- **Goodfellow:** The budget requests \$45 million for the Goodfellow facility relocation costs for OCIO (\$20 million), FSIS (\$16 million), and RD (\$9.8 million).

Status: Fully funded

FPAC

- **IT for Famers.gov:** A total of \$22.9 million for FSA (\$20.4 million) and NRCS (\$2.5 million) to sustain IT developments that allow customer access to a variety of FPAC information and services through a single digital experience.

Status: Fully funded

- **Business Center Information Technology:** Increase of \$10 million for digital records management.

Status: Not funded. The House Committee report states it did not fund the digital records request, though it strongly supports the initiative, because of the large lapsing balances at the end of fiscal year 2019. (FY19 funding unspent funds and sent to the Working Capital Fund)

- **FSA Recovery Jump Teams:** Increase of \$11.3 million and 324 staff years to support recovery jump teams to assist producers affected by disasters.

Status: **Not funded.**

- **Agricultural Credit Insurance Fund:** Due to the increases in loan volume and obligations in FY 2019 following the implementation of the higher loan limits for the Direct and Guaranteed Ownership and Operating loan program authorized in the 2018 Farm Bill, FSA estimates higher demand for FY 2021. The subsidy rates have decreased so there is no additional cost to providing the higher program levels requested in the budget.

Status: **Authorized higher program levels.**

In addition, based on FY 2019 direct farm ownership obligations and loan volume and projected higher demands in FY 2021, FSA requests \$13.2 million for Program Loan Cost Expenses (PLCE). This is \$3.2 million more than the \$10.1 million appropriated in FY 2020, which has not increased since FY 2017. The increased borrower demand for direct farm ownership loans due to the higher loan limits also raises the administrative expenses of FSA due to the greater legal complexity of entities purchasing the real estate and number of owners in those entities.

Status: **Fully funded.**

Rural Development

- **S&E funding:** Increase of \$23.7 million over FY 2020 enacted levels to support \$13 million in Salaries and Benefits funding to support 4600 staff years, and an additional \$48.5 million in IT spending (offset by \$37.9 million in contract reductions).

Status: **Fully funded.**

- **Higher Blends Infrastructure Incentive Program (HBIIIP):** \$100 million for grants to promote domestic ethanol and biodiesel infrastructure and consumption.

Status: **Not funded.**

- **Re-Connect Funding:** The President's Budget requests \$250 million for the Re-Connect program.

Status: **Fully funded.** Committee provided \$635 million for Re-Connect. (increase of \$55 million over FY20)

FSIS

- **Consumer Safety Inspectors:** Increase of \$5.7 million for grade conversion following a classification review of in plant personnel.

Status: **Partially funded.** Agreement includes \$4.5 million for conversion.

- **IT funding:** Increase of \$4.7 million to modernize and stabilize the aging infrastructure and increase connectivity.

Status: **Partially funded.** Agreement includes \$3.2 million for FSIS IT improvements.

MRP

- **APHIS Biotechnology Services:** Increase of \$8.5 million to implement executive order 13874.

Status: **Not funded.**

- **APHIS Veterinary Biologics:** Increase of \$3 million to decrease license review times.

Status: **Fully funded.**

REE

- **NBAF:** Increase of \$10 million for research and operations and maintenance of the National Bio and Agro-Defense Facility.

Status: **Fully funded.**

- **NASS:** Increase of \$10 million for a pilot study utilizing data which will lead to more precise and timelier early-season predictions of harvested acres and production.

Status: **Not funded.** The report language stated the Committee supports the goals of the study, but the budget justification did not provide sufficient information to support the increase. The report requests a briefing with the Committee on how the goals of the pilot study could be achieved through coordination with other USDA agencies.

- **OCS:** For the Agriculture Advanced Research and Development Authority (AGARDA) pilot authorized in the 2018 Farm Bill, request \$10 million to develop technologies, research tools, and products through advanced research on long-term and high-risk challenges for food and agriculture.

Status: **Not funded.** Agreement directs completion of the Farm Bill-required strategic plan to demonstrate USDA's vision for AGARDA.

- **ARS:** Increase of \$20 million for precision agriculture.

Status: Fully funded.

Department Administration/Staff Offices

- **Office of the Chief Scientist:** Increase of \$6 million for the Office of the Chief Scientist.

Status: Not funded. The report states that the Committee did not support the requested appropriation for the Office of the Chief Scientist as it has been historically funded through inter-agency agreements with the agencies in the mission area.

1. **OCIO:** Increase of \$31.5 million for IT network modernization to improve the operational efficiency of the Department's IT systems including the reduction of data centers and duplicative networks.

Status: Not funded.

2. **Budget Planning and Execution System:** Increase of \$12.5 million to support a Budget Planning and Execution System, of which \$8.5 million is for the system and \$4 million to support enhancements to USDA's Financial Management Modernization Initiative.

Status: Not funded.

3. **Human Resources:** Increase of \$1.6 million in the Office of Human Resource Management for an Enterprise Staff Acquisition Team and Human Resources Self-Service Dashboard to address hiring challenges.

Status: Partially funded. The bill provides a \$1 million increase for this purpose.

4. **Records Management:** Increase of \$2 million in the Office of the Executive Secretariat to meet the National Archives and Records Administration requirements to submit records solely in electronic format by December 31, 2022.

Status: Not funded.

5. **Contracting and Acquisitions:** Increase of \$2 million in the Office of Contracting and Procurement and the Office of Property and Fleet Management to support improved oversight of Departmental contracting and acquisition activities.

Status: Not funded.

- 6. Office of Information Affairs:** Increase of \$2.5 million to provide oversight over USDA's Freedom of Information Act program.

Status: **Not funded.**

- 7. One Neighborhood:** Increase of \$32 million to support consolidation and realignment of USDA's leased, occupied and owned space in the National Capital Region (NCR). In addition, \$12.5 million is requested for a fire suppression and security enhancements in the South Building.

Status: **Partially funded.** Continued FY20 funding level (\$66 million). The report states the Committee strongly supports One Neighborhood, but the budget justification did not provide sufficient justification to support the increase.

FY21 Regular Appropriations Policy Priorities:

FPAC

FPAC Leasing Authority: GSA leasing requirements are structured for metropolitan areas. They are not a good fit in rural communities and are leading to increased costs for FPAC agencies primarily when the standard space per employee increases annual costs. Language should be pursued to exempt all FPAC offices in rural communities from GSA requirements that lead to increased costs.

Status: **Not included**

CCC Spending Cap: In the FY 2021 President's Budget request, USDA included appropriations language that allows for off-cycle reimbursement of Net Realized Losses based on the June CCC's financial report, avoiding the need for an anomaly to this effect in a Continuing Resolution.

Status: **Not included**

Office closures: Request deletion of 2020 Farm Service Agency appropriations language related to office closures as the restrictions limit FSA's ability to respond to changing customer needs and program delivery methods. FSA has developed the Optimally Productive Office tool to analyze workload in county offices and realign resources to better meet customer demand.

Status: **Not included**

FSA IT Notification: Request deletion of 2020 FSA appropriations language regarding an IT report as the requirement imposes a constraint on timely acquisition of IT abilities.

Status: **Not included**

FSIS

2021 Overtime Holiday Status Proposed Language: Legislative language proposed to require establishments to pay fees to cover the costs of Overtime/Holiday services whenever the establishment is outside of its approved operating schedule.

Status: **Not included**

Department Administration

Transfer of Funds to the Working Capital Fund: The budget requests that unobligated balances transferred to the Working Capital Fund (WCF) be used for cloud adoption and migration, in addition to the uses already outlined in the GP. Currently, projects must be split to only fund non cloud items with funds provided through the WCF.

Status: **Not included**

Federal Advisory Committee Act: The budget requests flexibility in recovering expenses for all Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA) committees of the Department are allowed to spend. Current law does not clarify that it is for FACA activities specifically. This language would address the initial intent of the language.

Status: **Not included**

REE

NIFA: Consolidate NIFA's Research and Education, Extension, and Integrated activities accounts into one account. This structure would mirror the organization as a National Institute with a unified mission and offer opportunities to streamline administration of funds.

Status: **Not included**

FY21 Regular Appropriations – Additional Bill Provisions:

- **FNS SNAP Reforms:** USDA requested the agreement exclude House-passed bill provisions prohibiting implementation of FNS's proposed SUA rule and final ABAWDS rule.

Status: **USDA position supported by the agreement.**

- **USDA Relocations and Reorganizations:** Permanently prohibits moving any staff office or agency from the mission in area in which it was located on August 1, 2018, unless specifically authorized by Congress in law. (The language would not impact moves that occurred between August 1, 2018, and the date of enactment of the FY21 appropriations bill.)

- **Rainy River Watershed Withdrawal Documents:** USDA requested the agreement exclude a House-passed requirement for USDA to publish unredacted documents related to the Rainy River Watershed Withdrawal, including the incomplete environmental assessment from September 2018.

Status: USDA position supported by the agreement.

- **FSIS Line Speed Waivers:** USDA requested the agreement exclude a House-passed requirement for FSIS to revoke any line speed waivers issued to meat or poultry processors during the COVID-19 emergency period. It also prohibits the Secretary from issuing such waivers during the emergency period, unless CDC inspects the processing facility and certifies to USDA that any increase in line speed would not have an adverse impact on worker safety.

Status: USDA position supported by the agreement; however, the Conference report language directs FSIS to review the impact of waivers on employees' health and safety within 90 days of enactment and consult OSHA on future line speed increases.

- **DPA EO Implementation:** USDA requested the agreement exclude House-passed provisions prohibiting USDA funds to implement Executive Order 13917, which authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to use the authorities contained in the Defense Production Act to keep meat and poultry processing facilities operational during the COVID-19 emergency.

Status: USDA position supported by the agreement.

- **AMS/APHIS/FSIS User Fees:** The President's FY21 budget request included a proposal for USDA to implement new user fees under a general, government-wide authority enacted in 1952. Stakeholders expressed concern that Congress had not specifically authorized these increases and, in fact, Congress had rejected prior year budget proposals for legislation to increase user fees. USDA also shared concerns regarding the proposals with OMB. USDA provided technical assistance on a provision prohibiting use of funds in FY21 for rulemaking on new user fees under the 1952 authority.

Status: USDA position supported by the agreement.

- **Mandatory Livestock Reporting Act Extension:** The Act The Act mandates price reporting for cattle, boxed beef, and swine and allows USDA to establish mandatory price reporting for lamb purchases. USDA requested an extension through September 30, 2021 to provide Congress time to develop a long-term reauthorization.

Status: USDA position supported by the agreement.

FY 21 Requested Anomalies

- **APHIS AQI:** USDA requested a \$635 million appropriation to supplement COVID related reduction in AQI user fee collection.

Status: Fully funded.

- **ARS NBAF Floor-Mounted Equipment:** USDA requested \$19 million for NBAF floor mounted equipment, costs for which shifted to USDA following DHS construction delays.

Status: Not funded.

- **RD RHS Med West Loan:** \$21 million for Community Facilities loan costs for Med West Hospital in Alabama.

Status: Fully funded.

- **NRCS/FSA Attribution Technical Fix:** The statutory language for the attribution requirements under Section 1001(e) of the Food Security Act of 1985 contains incorrect cross-references to provisions in Section 1001D, causing confusion about the applicability of the attribution requirements to NRCS conservation programs.

Status: Not included. Statutory changes outside of the Farm Bill reauthorization require 8-corner sign-off. This provision was opposed by Sen. Stabenow.

- **FPAC WHIP+ Shortfall:** Rescission/appropriation of unobligated CFAP funds to meet WHIP+ demand and statutory language providing flexibility to repurpose unused disaster block grant funds.

Status: Included. The agreement provides immediate access to \$1 billion from the CARES Act for WHIP+, and then any additional block grant funds as those agreements are signed or completed (est. total ~\$500 million).

COVID-19 Relief Package Summary

Non-USDA Highlights within the \$908 billion agreement

- \$325 billion for SBA small business relief, including:
 - \$284 billion for Paycheck Protection Program second draw loans
 - Programmatic changes include income tax deductibility for loan forgiveness and ability for seasonal employers to calculate their loan amount based on the any 12-week period between Feb. 2019 and Feb. 2020.
 - \$15 billion for grants to shuttered live venues, theaters, museums, and zoos

- \$20 billion for the EIDL Advance program (EIDL borrowers receive \$1,000 per employee/\$10,000 maximum forgivable cash advance).
- \$160 billion in additional aid for state and local governments.
- \$300 million for NOAA fisheries disaster assistance
 - Aid distributed through coastal states and Great Lakes states with federal or tribal fisheries.
- Direct payments to taxpayers
 - Individuals earning up to \$75,000 per year will receive \$600, couples receive \$1,200, and families with children will receive \$600 per child.
- Enhanced Unemployment Insurance equal to \$300 per week for unemployed Americans
- \$82 billion to support COVID-19 mitigation upgrades at schools and colleges
- \$10 billion for child care assistance
- Federal eviction moratorium extended through January 31, 2021.
- \$3.2 billion for an FCC Emergency Broadband Benefit that will provide \$50 per month for broadband for low income families.
- \$4.7 billion for FCC broadband initiatives, including \$300 million for rural broadband deployment.

USDA COVID-19 Relief Package Provisions

Food/Agriculture Assistance (est. total funding: \$13 billion):

- **OSEC Producer Assistance:** Provides \$11.2 billion for producer assistance (\$9.7B for direct assistance and \$1.5B for food purchases via the Farmers to Families Food Box Program). The Secretary is required to: provide \$20 per planted acre for non-specialty crops; include insurance indemnities and disaster payments in 2019 sales for the purposes of CFAP 2 payments; pay 80% of the value of livestock that were depopulated including the cost of depopulation; provide a supplemental payment to livestock producers as partial compensation for disparities between CFAP 1 and CFAP 2; cover up to 80% of the revenue losses of contract growers lost due to termination of contracts; improve animal disease prevention and response capacity, support domestic users of cotton (textile mills); purchase food and agricultural products for distribution by nonprofit organizations; provide grants and loans to food processors and distributors for the procurement of personal protective equipment (PPE); and conduct a study of the efficacy of such purchase and distribution efforts. Authorizes the Secretary to: support processors for losses of crops; extend the term of marketing assistance loans to 12 months; assist

timber hauling and harvesting businesses; account for organic and added value price differentiation in calculating assistance; support producers of biofuels; make recourse loans available for dairy product processors; and provide supplemental assistance for producers whose calculated payments under CFAP 1 and 2 was reduced by payment limitations.

- **Specialty Crop Block Grants:** Provides \$100 million to supplement the Specialty Crop Block Grants Program.
- **Local Agriculture Market Program:** Provides \$100 million to supplement the Local Agriculture Market Program. Allows the Secretary to decrease required matching funds to 10% for awards funded by this supplemental.
- **Farming Opportunities Training and Outreach Program:** Provides \$75 million to supplement the Farming Opportunities Training and Outreach Program. Allows the Secretary to decrease required matching funds to 10% for awards funded by the supplemental.
- **Gus Schumacher Nutrition Incentive Program:** Provides \$75 million to supplement the Gus Schumacher Nutrition Incentive Program. Allows the Secretary to decrease required matching funds to 10% for awards funded by this supplemental.
- **ARS Nutrition Research:** Provides \$20 million for fiscal year 2021 and each fiscal year thereafter for the Agricultural Research Service to address gaps in nutrition research.
- **Supplemental Dairy Margin Coverage Payments:** Provides for supplemental coverage for dairy operations with less than 5 million pounds of annual production who are producing more milk than what is covered under the Dairy Margin Coverage program authorized in the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018. Such assistance is equal to 75% of the payment per hundredweight made under the existing safety net on any additional covered production.
- **Dairy Donation Program:** Establishes a dairy product donation program and appropriates \$400 million to provide reimbursements to eligible dairy operations who establish a partnership with and donate milk to public or private nonprofit institutions for distribution. Such reimbursement shall be representative of the value of the milk required to make the donated dairy product or the value of the fluid milk donated.
- **Establishment of Trust for Benefit of Unpaid Cash Sellers of Livestock:** Establishes livestock statutory dealer trust protections for owners of unpaid livestock in the event of a dealer default. Rep. Marshall (R-KS) carried this legislation with broad support from industry.
- **Grants for Improvements to Meat and Poultry Facilities to Allow for Interstate Shipment:** Establishes a program to make facility upgrade and planning grants to meat and poultry processors to help them move to federal inspection or state inspection programs allowing products to sell across state lines and provides \$60 million in funding.

- **Meat and Poultry Processing Study and Report:** Provides \$2 million for the completion of a study on the availability of financing for new and existing meat and poultry processing.
- **Support for Farm Stress Programs:** Establishes a program to distribute block grants to state departments of agriculture for use to support new and existing farm stress programs and provides \$28 million in funding.

Nutrition Assistance (est. total funding: \$13 billion)

- **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program:** Increases the value of SNAP benefits by 15% for the period of January 1, 2021 through June 30, 2021. Provides \$100 million for State administrative expenses. Disregards Pandemic-UI benefits from SNAP eligibility determinations. Waives work requirements for college students beginning 20 days after date of enactment. Requires the Secretary, upon the conclusion of the benefit increase, to release a report of SNAP account balances and the rate of SNAP redemptions for each of the preceding six months. Shortens the duration of the quality control waivers found in the October 2020 Continuing Resolution. Provides such sums appropriations as necessary.
- **Additional Assistance for SNAP Online Purchasing and Technology Improvements:** Provides \$5 million to support end-to-end testing for those retailers wanting to participate in the online SNAP pilots, as well as technical assistance to expedite their participation.
- **Nutrition Assistance Programs:** Provides \$614 million in nutrition block grant assistance to Puerto Rico, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.
- **Commodity Supplemental Assistance Program:** Provides \$13 million to the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP), to remain available until September 30, 2021.

Additional Legislative Riders

- **Sen. Roberts' National Bio and Agro-Defense Facility Act of 2020**
 - The Omnibus includes a version of Sen. Roberts' NBAF Mission Bill, which is substantially revised to address comments USDA provided through technical assistance.
 - In 2019, Sen. Roberts introduced legislation to affirm the mission of the National Bio and Agro-Defense facility (NBAF) to provide defense of U.S. food and agriculture. The legislation was approved by Committee on December 17, 2019, but never considered by the full Senate. Companion legislation was not introduced in the House.

- USDA concerns resolved in the revised text:
 - 1) Clearly establishes USDA as the lead agency for NBAF operations and research; however, USDA is required to coordinate with DHS and other appropriate Federal departments.
 - 2) Removes language providing for future transfer of NBAF jurisdiction to another Federal department.
 - 3) Removes language requiring a USDA-HHS Memorandum of Understanding related to NBAF research coordination and strikes any reference to a role for HHS in NBAF operations or research.
- **Establishment of the Smithsonian Museums of the American Latino and Woman’s History (Whitten/Yates Buildings)**
 - The FY21 Omnibus carried the text for S. 1267, the National Museum of the American Latino, and H.R. 1980, the Smithsonian Women’s History Museum Act.
 - In addition to formally establishing these new Smithsonian Museums, the legislation directs the Smithsonian Board of Regents with designating physical locations for the museums within 2 years of enactment.
 - The legislation explicitly states Congress’s intent to locate the new museums along the National Mall, and identifies locations for study, including the Whitten Building and undeveloped plots adjacent to the Yates Building.
 - Initial versions of the legislation offered the Secretary no recourse, if USDA buildings or property were designated by the Board of Regents. The Secretary would be required to transfer “as soon as practicable after the date on which the designation is made” administration of the building or land to the Smithsonian Institution.
 - The current version – revised via an amendment USDA supported – now requires the Secretary to notify Congress that he concurs with the siting before the Board issues their designation
 - USDA amendment incorporated into the revised version: “The Board of Regents shall not designate a site for the Museum that is under the administrative jurisdiction of another Federal agency or entity unless the head of the Federal agency or entity submits to each of the committees a written notification stating that the head of the Federal agency or entity concurs with locating the Museum on the land or in the structure that is under the administrative jurisdiction of the Federal agency or entity.”

Trump Makes Last Push to Speed Up Chicken Lines Despite Pandemic

(Bloomberg) -- Coronavirus cases are rising, but the Trump administration is making its last push to allow chicken slaughterhouses to speed up production lines, potentially threatening social distancing crucial to keeping workers safe. Three days after President Donald Trump lost his re-election bid, the U.S. Department of Agriculture submitted a proposal to raise the maximum line speed by 25% to the White House Office of Management and Budget for review. That's typically the last step before a proposed regulation is published.

The move risks bringing back a wave of coronavirus infections that shut several meat plants earlier this year just as the winter kicks in and cases surge across the U.S. Critics also say it's a lame-duck payoff to poultry producers that have been long-time supporters of Trump, who is fighting to keep office. It's unclear if a final rule could be issued before President-elect Joe Biden takes over.

"They are racing through a rule that could very seriously

endanger workers and consumers,” said Deborah Berkowitz, a former senior Labor Department official in the Obama administration. “This is the political payback to the poultry industry for being very close and supporting the administration.”

The Obama-Biden administration rejected proposals to allow faster processing lines at chicken plants after two years of study, said Berkowitz, who was chief of staff and a senior policy adviser for the Occupational Safety & Health Administration. Democratic presidential primary candidates Cory Booker, Elizabeth Warren, Bernie Sanders and Vice President-Elect Kamala Harris also backed legislation to prohibit USDA from granting line-speed waivers.

A USDA spokesman said the agency has been gathering data and assessing the ability of chicken plants to maintain process controls for years and that this proposal was already on the regulatory agenda this spring, before the elections. He also highlighted that line speeds apply to the evisceration process, which is mainly done by machines and not people.

In a notice on the OMB website, the agency said the change would allow poultry processors “to slaughter birds more efficiently while continuing to ensure food safety and effective online carcass inspection.”

Meat and poultry workers have been especially hard hit by the pandemic, with at least 19,800 infected or exposed to the virus and at least 128 deaths, according to the United Food and Commercial Workers International Union. Faster line speeds could mean more workers at factories at one time and also increase employee injuries, said Marc Perrone, president of the union, which represents more than 250,000 meatpacking and food processing workers.

“Slower line speeds protect workers from injuries and ensure safe social distancing to stop the spread of virus,” he said. “With poultry line speeds already moving at a breathtaking pace, any effort to increase these speeds is a direct threat to worker safety.”

The Trump administration has already used executive authority to loosen meat processing regulations. Last year, the USDA eliminated maximum line speeds for hog slaughterhouses. The

department has also issued waivers to permit individual poultry plants to operate at line speeds above the current federal maximum of 140 chickens bird per minute.

“The modernized system has been studied, debated, and reviewed in depth for 20+ years to assure its effectiveness in further modernizing chicken inspection while improving food safety and protecting workers,” said Tom Super, a spokesman for the National Chicken Council, an industry association. The USDA spokesman added injuries are dropping among poultry-processing workers. The reported injury and illness rate dropped to 3.2 per 100 full-time workers in 2019, down from 4.2 per 100 full time workers in 2016, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

There’s also a period of public comment and review that’s typically required after the publication of a proposed rule, which means it may not be approved before Trump steps down. Berkowitz, who is now at the National Employment Law Project, pointed to the political support for Trump from industry giants, while Perrone urged Biden to reverse the proposed Trump regulation if it is issued before the Democrat takes office.

The USDA in April authorized a record amount of line-speed waivers in the wake of the coronavirus outbreak that sickened thousands of workers at poultry plants, hitting chicken production. The waivers are being challenged in court by unions as “arbitrary and capricious” use of regulatory authority. The proposed rule change would eliminate the need for waivers.

MEMORANDUM ON IDENTIFICATION OF ESSENTIAL CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE WORKERS DURING COVID-19 RESPONSE

FROM: Christopher C. Krebs, Director, Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA)

As the Nation comes together to slow the spread of COVID-19, on March 16th, the President issued updated Coronavirus Guidance for America. This guidance states that:

"If you work in a critical infrastructure industry, as defined by the Department of Homeland Security, such as healthcare services and pharmaceutical and food supply, you have a special responsibility to maintain your normal work schedule."

The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) executes the Secretary of Homeland Security's responsibilities as assigned under the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to provide strategic guidance, promote a national unity of effort, and coordinate the overall federal effort to ensure the security and resilience of the Nation's critical infrastructure. CISA uses trusted partnerships with both the public and private sectors to deliver infrastructure resilience assistance and guidance to a broad range of partners.

In accordance with this mandate, and in collaboration with other federal agencies and the private sector, CISA developed an initial list of "Essential Critical Infrastructure Workers" to help State and local officials as they work to protect their communities, while ensuring continuity of functions critical to public health and safety, as well as economic and national security. The list can also inform critical infrastructure community decision-making to determine the sectors, sub-sectors, segments, or critical functions that should continue normal operations, appropriately modified to account for Centers for Disease Control (CDC) workforce and customer protection guidance.

The attached list identifies workers who conduct a range of operations and services that are essential to continued critical infrastructure viability, including staffing operations centers, maintaining and repairing critical infrastructure, operating call centers, working construction, and performing management functions, among others. The industries they support represent, but are not necessarily limited to, medical and healthcare, telecommunications, information technology systems, defense, food and agriculture, transportation and logistics, energy, water and wastewater, law enforcement, and public works.

Temporary Allowances for Labels Going to Retail

FSIS is exercising enforcement discretion for a temporary period to provide labeling flexibilities for products intended for food service going to retail. Below please find certain situations describing how product can move to retail with certain labeling deviations. Please note, these situations apply to product that has already been produced. Product currently being produced is expected to meet all requirements. FSIS will provide additional information on labeling issues in the future if necessary.

Labeling at a Federal Establishment

Product produced at a Federal establishment typically intended for distribution to hotels, restaurants, or similar institutions (HRI) will have modified labels applied by the Federal establishment so that the products can now be sold at retail. The label would be required to bear all required features. FSIS will not object to the use of labels without nutrition labeling, even if the establishment does not meet an exemption under 9 CFR 317.400 and 381.500, provided the labels do not bear any nutrition claims. The absence of nutrition labeling would normally require an establishment to submit for temporary approval under 9 CFR 412.1(f)(1). However, if the only deficiency is the absence of nutrition labeling, FSIS will not require establishments to submit for temporary approval for the next 60 days. If the proposed label has other deficiencies from FSIS labeling requirements (e.g., formulation changes not reflected in the ingredients statement), establishments will need to submit the label for temporary approval for an evaluation on a case by case basis.

Labeling at Retail for Bulk Product Already in Commerce

Bulk product, even if labeled for HRI (e.g. Child Nutrition labeled product or product labeled for a specific restaurant or institution), may be distributed to retail where the retailer will repack the product into smaller consumer size packages and apply a label. The label applied to the repackaged product will need to bear all required features except for the USDA mark of inspection. The only deviation from current requirements under 9 CFR 317.8 and 381.129 is the bulk product may be distributed in a manner that is inconsistent with a statement of limited use on the outer box. For example, a box labeled "for school foodservice use only" can now be distributed to a retail outlet for repackaging and labeling. FSIS will not object to products being distributed in a manner that is inconsistent with the statement of limited use under 9 CFR 317.8 and 381.129 for the next 60 days starting on March 23, 2020.
