Re: Sunshine Law Request

Dear Custodian of Records:

Pursuant to the Missouri Sunshine Law, Mo. Rev. Stat. §§ 610.010 et seq., American Oversight makes the following request for records.

In January 2021, State Representative Adam Schnelting and State Senator Rick Brattin introduced legislation in the House and Senate that would shield drivers from liability if they hit protesters with their cars.¹

American Oversight seeks records with the potential to shed light on any external influences in the drafting of the legislation.

Requested Records

American Oversight, requests that the Missouri House of Representatives produce copies of the following records within three business days:

All emails communications (including emails, email attachments, complete email chains, calendar invitations, and calendar invitation attachments) sent by State Representative Adam Schnelting containing any of the following key terms:

Please provide all responsive records from November 1, 2020, through date of search.

In an effort to accommodate your office and reduce the number of potentially responsive records to be processed and produced, American Oversight has limited its request to emails sent by Rep. Shnelting. To be clear, however, American Oversight still requests that complete email chains be produced, displaying both sent and received messages. This means, for example, that both Rep. Shnelting’s response to an email containing one of the key terms listed above and the initial received message are responsive to this request and should be produced.

Fee Waiver Request

In accordance with Mo. Rev. Stat. § 610.026.1(1), American Oversight requests a waiver of fees associated with processing this request for records. Disclosure of the requested records is in the public interest because it will likely contribute to a better understanding of relevant government procedures by the general public in a significant way. Moreover, the request is primarily and fundamentally for non-commercial purposes.

American Oversight requests a waiver of fees because disclosure of the requested information “is likely to contribute significantly to public understanding of the operations or activities of [a] public governmental body.”² The public has a significant interest in the actions of its elected officials and the driver liability shield legislation’s origin and its impact on the community, safety, and the right to protest. Records with the potential to shed light on this issue would contribute significantly to public understanding of operations of the government. American Oversight is committed to transparency and makes the responses agencies provide to public records requests publicly available, and the public’s understanding of the government’s activities would be enhanced through American Oversight’s analysis and publication of these records.

This request is primarily and fundamentally for non-commercial purposes.³ As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, American Oversight does not have a commercial purpose and the release of the information requested is not in American Oversight’s financial interest. American Oversight’s mission is to promote transparency in government, to educate the

public about government activities, and to ensure the accountability of government officials. American Oversight uses the information gathered, and its analysis of it, to educate the public through reports, press releases, or other media. American Oversight also makes materials it gathers available on its public website and promotes their availability on social media platforms, such as Facebook and Twitter.⁴

American Oversight has also demonstrated its commitment to the public disclosure of documents and creation of editorial content through regular substantive analyses posted to its website.⁵ Examples reflecting this commitment to the public disclosure of documents and the creation of editorial content include the posting of records and analysis related to the organization's investigations into misconduct and corruption in state governments;⁶ posting records and analysis of federal and state governments' responses to the Coronavirus pandemic;⁷ posting records received as part of American Oversight's "Audit the Wall" project to gather and analyze information related to the Trump administration's proposed construction of a barrier along the U.S.-Mexico border, and analyses of what those records reveal;⁸ and the posting of records related to an ethics waiver received by a senior U.S. Department of Justice attorney and an

analysis of what those records demonstrated regarding the Department's process for issuing such waivers.⁹

Accordingly, American Oversight qualifies for a fee waiver.

Guidance Regarding the Search & Processing of Requested Records

In connection with its request for records, American Oversight provides the following guidance regarding the scope of the records sought and the search and processing of records:

- Please search all locations and systems likely to have responsive records, regardless of format, medium, or physical characteristics.
- Our request for records includes any attachments to those records or other materials enclosed with those records when they were previously transmitted. To the extent that an email is responsive to our request, our request includes all prior messages sent or received in that email chain, as well as any attachments to the email.
- Please search all relevant records or systems containing records regarding agency business. Do not exclude records regarding agency business contained in files, email accounts, or devices in the personal custody of your officials, such as personal email accounts.
- In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the requested records.¹⁰ If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically why it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.
- Please take appropriate steps to ensure that records responsive to this request are not deleted by the agency before the completion of processing for this request. If records potentially responsive to this request are likely to be located on systems where they are subject to potential deletion, including on a scheduled basis, please take steps to prevent that deletion, including, as appropriate, by instituting a litigation hold on those records.

2 the premises. If such person refuses to leave the premises and a
3 peace officer is summoned, such person may be issued a citation
4 for an amount not to exceed one hundred dollars for the first
5 offense. If a second citation for a similar violation occurs
6 within a six-month period, such person shall be fined an amount
7 not to exceed two hundred dollars and his or her permit, and, if
8 applicable, endorsement to carry concealed firearms shall be
9 suspended for a period of one year. If a third citation for a
10 similar violation is issued within one year of the first
11 citation, such person shall be fined an amount not to exceed five
12 hundred dollars and shall have his or her concealed carry permit,
13 and, if applicable, endorsement revoked and such person shall not
14 be eligible for a concealed carry permit for a period of three
15 years. Upon conviction of charges arising from a citation issued
16 pursuant to this subsection, the court shall notify the sheriff
17 of the county which issued the concealed carry permit, or, if the
18 person is a holder of a concealed carry endorsement issued prior

2 hijacking is a class B felony.

3 2. The offense of "assault with the intent to commit bus
4 hijacking" is defined as an intimidation, threat, assault or
5 battery toward any driver, attendant or guard of a bus so as to
6 interfere with the performance of duties by such person. Assault
7 to commit bus hijacking is a class D felony.

8 3. Any person, who, in the commission of such intimidation,
9 threat, assault or battery with the intent to commit bus
10 hijacking, employs a dangerous or deadly weapon or other means
11 capable of inflicting serious bodily injury shall, upon
12 conviction, be guilty of a class A felony.

13 4. Except as otherwise provided under section 571.107, any
14 passenger who boards a bus with a dangerous or deadly weapon or
15 other means capable of inflicting serious bodily injury concealed
16 upon his or her person or effects is guilty of the felony of
17 "possession and concealment of a dangerous or deadly weapon" upon
18 a bus. Possession and concealment of a dangerous and deadly
19 weapon by a passenger upon a bus is a class D felony. The
20 provisions of this subsection shall not apply to:

6 and well-being of passengers and others having a bona fide

9 fide business within the terminal. Any such refusal shall not be
10 inconsistent or contrary to state or federal laws, regulations
11 pursuant thereto, or to any ordinance of the political
12 subdivision in which such terminal is located. A duly authorized
13 company representative may ask any person in a terminal or on the
14 premises of a terminal to identify himself or herself and state
15 his or her business. Failure to comply with such request or
16 failure to state an acceptable business purpose shall be grounds
17 for the company representative to request that such person leave
18 the terminal. Refusal to comply with such request shall

26 of any such item or material, the company may obtain possession
27 and retain custody of such item or material until it is



Representative Schnelting,
To help better serve your request I wanted to present additional information regarding Scenic Byways signing and provide a few signing examples of the Missouri Scenic Byways over the Memorial Designation Program. Missouri Scenic Byways signs may be manufactured and installed by MoODT (if the designation is approved by the Commission, the signs are at no cost to the communities) at periodic intervals along the designated route. At locations where roadside features have been developed to enhance the traveler's experience, the Missouri Scenic Byways Point of Interest plaque may be placed below the Missouri Scenic Byway sign to inform travelers that the site contributes to the byway travel experience. The end of the byway may be marked with the Missouri Scenic Byways Confirmation sign with the END auxiliary sign mounted below.




Memorials Designations signing only signs the beginning and end of the designated route location. If looking to promote a route for tourism, the Missouri Scenic Byways allows far greater recognition opportunities in promoting the route for the communities with traveling public.



The Missouri Scenic Byway signs shall be installed at the beginning of the byway and shall include the byway name at the bottom of the sign. Missouri Scenic Byways Confirmation signs shall be installed above route turn assemblies and at intersections where the designated route turns or follows a different numbered highway.

When a Missouri Scenic Byways sign is installed on state maintained routes, the design shown shall be used. Use of this design shall be limited to routes that have been designated as a Missouri Scenic Byway by the Commission.

Examples of the Use of the Missouri Scenic Byways Sign



Our Missouri Scenic Byways Coordinator, Brenda Harris, will be contacting you and your office to discuss the options available and the processes for the Scenic Byways program. If you wish to continue to designating a memorial highway, we are happy to assist with you that request. In order for MoDOT to comply with state and federal policies of the Scenic designations we would not be able to allow "Scenic" on the sign of the Memorial Highway program, however, having on "highway" on the last line of the memorial designation sign is allowable.

I believe you are looking to designate the roadways as a scenic byway. The Scenic Byways Program allows any public road, rural, suburban or urban to be nominated for scenic byway designation. Those roads carry visitors to state and

local parks or other recreation areas, or to sites of historical, cultural or archaeological significance. They can also be roads that local communities feel are important to their identify. There is a particular process for designating a scenic byway. Anyone can nominate a road for a scenic byway. There are application guidelines, which I will have its Program Coordinator, Brenda Harris, contact you regarding the process and guidelines. MoDOT Memorial Highway and Bridge Designation Program has two processes, Legislative Process – honors fallen law enforcement, military soldiers, emergency personnel or state employees killed in the line of duty, Application Process – designates Missouri highways and bridges after an individual, organization, event or place. These programs are not for advertising or promoting tourism.

Dear Representative Schnelting,

Good afternoon! Listed below are two route options for the George Washing memorial designation and one route option for the Daniel Boone memorial designation for your review. The reason for two options for the George Washington memorial is we were not quite clear on whether or not you wanted the designation to extend to State Highway 47 and wanted to present that an option of consideration.

In regards to scenic/heritage highways and trails, unfortunately, MoDOT cannot not sign scenic/heritage highways or trails through the memorial designations program. There are specialized programs and organizations who establish Scenic Highways, Heritage Highways, and Trails in Missouri, which have very specific guidelines and processes, such the National Park Service, Scenic Byways, and etc. We would however be delighted to assist you in your request in designating the highway as a "Memorial Highway" or "Highway" through MoDOT's Memorial Highway Designation program.

If you could please take a moment to review the below and let us know if any of those options meet your needs we would appreciate it.

George Washington Memorial Designation:

Route Option # 1:

The portion of State Highway 94 from State Highway TT to State Highway F in St. Charles County shall be designated as "George Washington Highway". The department of transportation shall erect and maintain appropriate signs designating such highway, with the cost to be paid for by private donations. (16.6 miles)



Route Option # 2:

The portion of State Highway 94 from State Highway 47 to State Highway F in St. Charles County shall be designated as "George Washington Highway". The department of transportation shall erect and maintain appropriate signs designating such highway, with the cost to be paid for by private donations. (17.4 miles)



Daniel Boone Memorial:

The portion of State Highway F from State Highway 94 continuing west to Femme Osage Creek Road in St. Charles County shall be designated as "Daniel Boone Highway". The department of transportation shall erect and maintain appropriate signs designating such highway, with the cost to be paid for by private donations. (6.6 miles)

The **Governor's Patriotism Advisory Commission**

Within 120 days of the effective date of the legislation, the Commissioner of DESE shall establish within DESE the Governor's Patriotism Advisory Commission to better enable a rising generation to understand the history and principles of the founding of the United States in 1776 and to strive to form a more perfect Union and to,

produce a report for the Governor within 1 year of the effective date of the law, which shall be publicly disseminated, regarding the core principles of the American founding and how these principles may be understood to further enjoyment of "the blessings of liberty" and to promote our striving "to form a more perfect Union." The Commission may solicit statements and contributions from intellectual and cultural figures in addition to the views of the Commission members;

facilitate the development and implementation of a "Governor's Patriot Award" to recognize student knowledge of the American founding, including knowledge about the Founders, the Declaration of Independence, the Constitutional Convention, and the great soldiers and battles of the American Revolutionary War;

advise executive departments and agencies with regard to their efforts to ensure patriotic education — meaning the presentation of the history of the American founding and foundational principles, the examination of how the United States has grown closer to those principles throughout its history, and the explanation of why commitment to America's aspirations is beneficial and justified — is provided to the public at state parks, battlefields, monuments, museums, installations, landmarks, cemeteries, and other places important to the American Revolution and the American founding, as appropriate and consistent with applicable law;

advise agencies on prioritizing the American founding in state grants and initiatives, and as appropriate and consistent with applicable law; and

facilitate, advise upon, and promote other activities to support public knowledge and patriotic education on the American Revolution and the American founding, as appropriate and consistent with applicable law.

The Governor's Patriotism Advisory Commission shall have a Chair and Vice Chair, designated by the Governor from among its members. An Executive Director, designated by the Governor for Domestic Policy, shall coordinate the work of the Commission. The Chair and Vice Chair shall work with the Executive Director to convene regular meetings of the Commission, determine its agenda, and direct its work, consistent with this law.

The DESE shall provide funding and administrative support for the Commission, to the extent permitted by law and subject to the availability of appropriations.

Members of the Governor's Patriotism Advisory Commission shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for travel expenses.

The Governor's Patriotism Advisory Commission shall terminate 2 years from the date of this order, unless extended by the Governor.

70.441. 1. As used in this section, the following terms have the following meanings:

(1) "Agency", the bi-state development agency created by compact under section 70.370;

(2) "Conveyance" includes bus, paratransit vehicle, rapid transit car or train, locomotive, or other vehicle used or held for use by the agency as a means of transportation of passengers;

(3) "Facilities" includes all property and equipment, including, without limitation, rights-of-way and related trackage, rails, signals, power, fuel, communication and ventilation systems, power plants, stations, terminals, signage, storage yards, depots, repair and maintenance shops, yards, offices, parking lots, and other real estate or personal property used or held for or incidental to the operation, rehabilitation, or improvement of any public mass transportation system of the agency;

1 (4) "Person", any individual, firm, copartnership,
2 corporation, association, or company; and

3 (5) "Sound production device" includes, but is not limited
4 to, any radio receiver, phonograph, television receiver, musical
5 instrument, tape recorder, cassette player, speaker device and
6 any sound amplifier.

7 2. In interpreting or applying this section, the following
8 provisions shall apply:

9 (1) Any act otherwise prohibited by this section is lawful
10 if specifically authorized by agreement, permit, license or other
11 writing duly signed by an authorized officer of the agency or if
12 performed by an officer, employee or designated agent of the
13 agency acting within the scope of his or her employment or
14 agency;

15 (2) Rules shall apply with equal force to any person
16 assisting, aiding or abetting another, including a minor, in any
17 of the acts prohibited by the rules or assisting, aiding or
18 abetting another in the avoidance of any of the requirements of
19 the rules; and

20 (3) The singular shall mean and include the plural; the
21 masculine gender shall mean the feminine and the neuter genders;
22 and vice versa.

23 3. (1) No person shall use or enter upon the light rail
24 conveyances of the agency without payment of the fare or other
25 lawful charges established by the agency. Any person on any such
26 conveyance must have properly validated fare media in his
27 possession. This ticket must be valid to or from the station the

1 passenger is using, and must have been used for entry for the
2 trip then being taken;

3 (2) No person shall use any token, pass, badge, ticket,
4 document, transfer, card or fare media to gain entry to the
5 facilities or conveyances of, or make use of the services of, the
6 agency, except as provided, authorized or sold by the agency and
7 in accordance with any restriction on the use thereof imposed by
8 the agency;

9 (3) No person shall enter upon parking lots designated by
10 the agency as requiring payment to enter, either by electronic
11 gate or parking meters, where the cost of such parking fee is
12 visibly displayed at each location, without payment of such fees
13 or other lawful charges established by the agency;

14 (4) Except for employees of the agency acting within the
15 scope of their employment, no person shall sell, provide, copy,
16 reproduce or produce, or create any version of any token, pass,
17 badge, ticket, document, transfer, card or any other fare media
18 or otherwise authorize access to or use of the facilities,
19 conveyances or services of the agency without the written
20 permission of an authorized representative of the agency;

21 (5) No person shall put or attempt to put any paper,
22 article, instrument or item, other than a token, ticket, badge,
23 coin, fare card, pass, transfer or other access authorization or
24 other fare media issued by the agency and valid for the place,
25 time and manner in which used, into any fare box, pass reader,
26 ticket vending machine, parking meter, parking gate or other fare
27 collection instrument, receptacle, device, machine or location;

1 (6) Tokens, tickets, fare cards, badges, passes, transfers
2 or other fare media that have been forged, counterfeited,
3 imitated, altered or improperly transferred or that have been
4 used in a manner inconsistent with this section shall be
5 confiscated;

6 (7) No person may perform any act which would interfere
7 with the provision of transit service or obstruct the flow of
8 traffic on facilities or conveyances or which would in any way
9 interfere or tend to interfere with the safe and efficient
10 operation of the facilities or conveyances of the agency;

11 (8) All persons on or in any facility or conveyance of the
12 agency shall:

13 (a) Comply with all lawful orders and directives of any
14 agency employee acting within the scope of his employment;

15 (b) Obey any instructions on notices or signs duly posted
16 on any agency facility or conveyance; and

17 (c) Provide accurate, complete and true information or
18 documents requested by agency personnel acting within the scope
19 of their employment and otherwise in accordance with law;

20 (9) No person shall falsely represent himself or herself as
21 an agent, employee or representative of the agency;

22 (10) No person on or in any facility or conveyance shall:

23 (a) Litter, dump garbage, liquids or other matter, or
24 create a nuisance, hazard or [~~unsanitary~~] insanitary condition,
25 including, but not limited to, spitting and urinating, except in
26 facilities provided;

27 (b) Drink any alcoholic beverage or possess any opened or

1 unsealed container of alcoholic beverage, except on premises duly
2 licensed for the sale of alcoholic beverages, such as bars and
3 restaurants;

4 (c) Enter or remain in any facility or conveyance while his
5 ability to function safely in the environment of the agency
6 transit system is impaired by the consumption of alcohol or by
7 the taking of any drug;

8 (d) Loiter or stay on any facility of the agency;

9 (e) Consume foods or liquids of any kind, except in those
10 areas specifically authorized by the agency;

11 (f) Smoke or carry an open flame or lighted match, cigar,
12 cigarette, pipe or torch, except in those areas or locations
13 specifically authorized by the agency; or

14 (g) Throw or cause to be propelled any stone, projectile or
15 other article at, from, upon or in a facility or conveyance;

16 (11) Except as otherwise provided under section 571.107, no
17 weapon or other instrument intended for use as a weapon may be
18 carried in or on any facility or conveyance, except for law
19 enforcement personnel. For the purposes hereof, a weapon shall
20 include, but not be limited to, a firearm, switchblade knife,
21 sword, or any instrument of any kind known as blackjack, billy
22 club, club, sandbag, metal knuckles, leather bands studded with
23 metal, wood impregnated with metal filings or razor blades;
24 except that this subdivision shall not apply to a rifle or
25 shotgun which is unloaded and carried in any enclosed case, box
26 or other container which completely conceals the item from view
27 and identification as a weapon;

1 (12) No explosives, flammable liquids, acids, fireworks or
2 other highly combustible materials or radioactive materials may
3 be carried on or in any facility or conveyance, except as
4 authorized by the agency;

5 (13) No person, except as specifically authorized by the
6 agency, shall enter or attempt to enter into any area not open to
7 the public, including, but not limited to, motorman's cabs,
8 conductor's cabs, bus operator's seat location, closed-off areas,
9 mechanical or equipment rooms, concession stands, storage areas,
10 interior rooms, tracks, roadbeds, tunnels, plants, shops, barns,
11 train yards, garages, depots or any area marked with a sign
12 restricting access or indicating a dangerous environment;

13 (14) No person may ride on the roof, the platform between
14 rapid transit cars, or on any other area outside any rapid
15 transit car or bus or other conveyance operated by the agency;

16 (15) No person shall extend his hand, arm, leg, head or
17 other part of his or her person or extend any item, article or
18 other substance outside of the window or door of a moving rapid
19 transit car, bus or other conveyance operated by the agency;

20 (16) No person shall enter or leave a rapid transit car,
21 bus or other conveyance operated by the agency except through the
22 entrances and exits provided for that purpose;

23 (17) No animals may be taken on or into any conveyance or
24 facility except the following:

25 (a) An animal enclosed in a container, accompanied by the
26 passenger and carried in a manner which does not annoy other
27 passengers; and

1 (b) Working dogs for law enforcement agencies, agency dogs
2 on duty, dogs properly harnessed and accompanying blind or
3 hearing-impaired persons to aid such persons, or dogs
4 accompanying trainers carrying a certificate of identification
5 issued by a dog school;

6 (18) No vehicle shall be operated carelessly, or
7 negligently, or in disregard of the rights or safety of others or
8 without due caution and circumspection, or at a speed in such a
9 manner as to be likely to endanger persons or property on
10 facilities of the agency. The speed limit on parking lots and
11 access roads shall be posted as fifteen miles per hour unless
12 otherwise designated.

13 4. (1) Unless a greater penalty is otherwise provided by
14 the laws of the state, any violation of this section shall
15 constitute a misdemeanor, and any person committing a violation
16 thereof shall be subject to arrest and, upon conviction in a
17 court of competent jurisdiction, shall pay a fine in an amount
18 not less than twenty-five dollars and no greater than two hundred
19 fifty dollars per violation, in addition to court costs. Any
20 default in the payment of a fine imposed pursuant to this section

14 5. Any person who is convicted, pleads guilty, or pleads
15 nolo contendere for failing to pay the proper fare, fee, or other
16 charge for the use of the facilities and conveyances of the
17 bi-state development agency, as described in subdivision (3) of
18 subsection 4 of this section, may, in addition to the unpaid
19 fares or charges and any fines, penalties, or sentences imposed

6 571.107. 1. A concealed carry permit issued pursuant to
7 sections 571.101 to 571.121, a valid concealed carry endorsement
8 issued prior to August 28, 2013, or a concealed carry endorsement
9 or permit issued by another state or political subdivision of
10 another state shall authorize the person in whose name the permit
11 or endorsement is issued to carry concealed firearms on or about
12 his or her person or vehicle throughout the state. No concealed
13 carry permit issued pursuant to sections 571.101 to 571.121,
14 valid concealed carry endorsement issued prior to August 28,
15 2013, or a concealed carry endorsement or permit issued by
16 another state or political subdivision of another state shall
17 authorize any person to carry concealed firearms into:

18 (1) Any police, sheriff, or highway patrol office or

26 premises of the polling place shall not be a criminal offense so
27 long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished

2 (3) The facility of any adult or juvenile detention or
3 correctional institution, prison or jail. Possession of a
4 firearm in a vehicle on the premises of any adult, juvenile
5 detention, or correctional institution, prison or jail shall not
6 be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from
7 the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;

8 (4) Any courthouse solely occupied by the circuit,
9 appellate or supreme court, or any courtrooms, administrative
10 offices, libraries or other rooms of any such court whether or
11 not such court solely occupies the building in question. This
12 subdivision shall also include, but not be limited to, any
13 juvenile, family, drug, or other court offices, any room or
14 office wherein any of the courts or offices listed in this
15 subdivision are temporarily conducting any business within the
16 jurisdiction of such courts or offices, and such other locations
17 in such manner as may be specified by supreme court rule pursuant
18 to subdivision (6) of this subsection. Nothing in this

4 (5) Any meeting of the governing body of a unit of local
5 government; or any meeting of the general assembly or a committee
6 of the general assembly, except that nothing in this subdivision
7 shall preclude a member of the body holding a valid concealed
8 carry permit or endorsement from carrying a concealed firearm at
9 a meeting of the body which he or she is a member. Possession of
10 a firearm in a vehicle on the premises shall not be a criminal
11 offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or
12 brandished while the vehicle is on the premises. Nothing in this
13 subdivision shall preclude a member of the general assembly, a
14 full-time employee of the general assembly employed under Section
15 17, Article III, Constitution of Missouri, legislative employees
16 of the general assembly as determined under section 21.155, or
17 statewide elected officials and their employees, holding a valid
18 concealed carry permit or endorsement, from carrying a concealed

23 municipality may by rule, administrative regulation, or ordinance

27 building in which the carrying of concealed firearms is

1 prohibited or limited shall be clearly identified by signs posted
2 at the entrance to the restricted area. The statute, rule or
3 ordinance shall exempt any building used for public housing by
4 private persons, highways or rest areas, firing ranges, and

15 the consent of the minister or person or persons representing the
16 religious organization that exercises control over the place of

Hello Mr Carroll,

I have already pre-filed the bill, yes. It will not go before a committee unless or until it is referred to one, probably sometime in January or early February as the process normally goes.

I filed the Fleeing Motorist Protection Act to ensure that motorists who are trapped in their vehicle during a riot have a legal right to flight without being civilly and criminally liable for self-defense. If your grandparents are caught in a mob and are being threatened, they shouldn't be held liable for inadvertently hitting a rioter if they flee the scene in order to save those in the car from physical danger. That said, the bill does not change our laws on vehicular assault nor excuse gross negligence.

While I don't know how many of these specific situations have led to civil litigation, as the media rarely covers anything more than whether or not the motorist is criminally charged, there is currently no protection from civil liability for motorists who are guilty of nothing more than an attempt to flee a dangerous or life threatening situation that they are not responsible for creating. As a legislator, it is my responsibility to ensure the government protects my constituents, and I try to take a proactive approach whenever possible.

Here are some others - would you have anything to do with these?

1) Establishing the Governor's Patriotism Advisory Commission - a temporary commission under DESE of up to 20 members for a period of two years, appointed by the Governor who will advise the Governor on how best to instill patriotism into public school curriculum for future generations. This is based upon President Trump's 1776 Commission but without an EO to establish it.

2) The Fleeing Motorist Act - Removing liability for motorists who are caught in a riot or "Protest" in their vehicles if the driver has reason to believe they or their passengers lives are in danger or are in danger of personal injury. Florida recently enacted something similar.

3) The Protection of Peaceful Protest Act - If you are convicted of rioting or looting, you lose government benefits for a period (unemployment insurance, medicaid, for instance).

4) The First Responders Protection Act - Would do a few things. 1) Upon request of the police officer, make it mandatory for a county clerk or assessor to redact their personally identifying information from public databases like property searches, tax records, etc. 2) Make doxing a police officer a class A Misdemeanor (if not already). 4) Anyone who assaults a first responder (firefighter, police officer, EMT) loses their government benefits, like medicaid, unemployment, for a period of time.

5) I don't have a name for it yet, but I'd like a bill that would make it illegal for any individual or organization to bring suit against another individual, farmer or business on behalf of "nature" or "earth." Ohio passed something similar this year.




Representative Schnelting Introduces the Missouri Monument Preservation Act

Representative Schnelting wants to protect monuments on public property. House Bill 55 will require certain procedures to remove, alter or, disturb certain monuments.

"Many of you recall the disturbing scenes last year of angry mobs tearing down our monuments and pressuring local officials to remove them as well. Statues of our nations founding fathers, war heroes, former slaves, explorers, presidents and religious figures. This was not merely a movement to 'cleanse' the nation of confederate statues but to erase our national history & acknowledgements of both our achievements as well as our shortcomings. If you remove our markings, remove our heritage, remove our past... you can then rebuild upon whatever narrative suits your aims. Control the narrative, control the future" the Representative said.

This bill specifies that a political subdivision shall not remove or alter any monument without approval of the people at the general election.





House Approves License Reciprocity for Skilled Veterans (HB 476)

This week the members of the Missouri House continued their efforts to make Missouri an attractive location for military members and their families to live and work. The House advanced a piece of legislation that will allow veterans to use the skills they obtained in the military to more easily find jobs in the private sector.

The legislation builds on the efforts made by the legislature in 2020 to allow professionals to move to Missouri and to continue working in their professions without delay. HB 2046 set up a universal license recognition system that allows professionals licensed in other states to come to Missouri and enter the workforce. HBs 1511 & 1452 removed the barriers that impede military spouse licensure and allows them to practice their occupation as long as they hold a valid current license issued by another state or territory of the United States.

While the bills approved last year made significant stride in removing barriers for skilled professionals, the sponsor of this year's bill said his visits to military bases across the state revealed there was another issue to address. He said military officials told him that "as they try and help veterans reintegrate back into the private sector, it can be very challenging for them to do that quickly and easily, and to take all that good training they had in the military and apply it to the private sector."

The sponsor said his bill will allow skilled veterans to "quickly and easily obtain a license and immediately plug into our state economy here and become productive citizens of the state." Specifically, the legislation would include a Military Occupational Specialty as a type of licensure when applying for licensure in Missouri in the same occupation under Missouri's Reciprocity Laws. In effect, it would treat military occupation specialties the same as an out-of-state license. Licensing boards in Missouri could still limit the scope of a license provided through the bill if the training and professional requirements are different between the military and civilian positions.

The bill now moves to the Senate for consideration.

House Approves Bill to Improve Local Government Transparency (HB 271)

Legislation that is now on its way to the Senate would create a database that allows taxpayers to search expenditures and payments received and made by counties and

municipalities. The bill would create the Missouri Local Government Expenditure Database, which would be an easy to use, downloadable database housed on the Missouri Accountability Portal.

The bill is meant to improve transparency by providing public access to local government expenditure data. The database would be maintained by the Office of Administration and would include extensive information about a given municipality's or county's expenditures and the vendors to whom payments were made.

The sponsor of the bill said the database will be beneficial to taxpayers who can see how their dollars are spent, but will also provide benefits to municipalities. He said, "I think it's really a beneficial thing for the cities in the long run to do this because they're going to find out that they're going to be able to use that information to their advantage to help make the city or the county more effective."

A municipality or county may voluntarily participate in the database, or may be required to participate through a petition process used by its residents. The database would provide expenditure data for each fiscal year beginning on or after December 31, 2022.

Legislation Approved to Protect Information of Private Citizens (HB 362)

A bill approved by the House this week would allow public governmental bodies to protect certain information shared by private citizens. The bill is meant to prevent individuals and organizations from obtaining contact information of members of the public to use for their own purposes such as political campaigning.

When a public governmental body receives email addresses and telephone numbers submitted by individuals for the sole purpose of receiving electronic or other communications, the bill allows the body to close the records. The bill also allows a public governmental body to close records of utility usage and bill records for customers of public utilities unless the customer requests them or authorizes their release. Additionally, the bill allows a public governmental body to close records related to security and evacuation procedures, including software or surveillance companies that secure the building, for public governmental property.

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Utility Assistance for Low-Income Missourians Expanded

Missourians struggling with their heating bill because of the extreme cold will now have additional help. Gov. Mike Parson recently announced the state's Energy Crisis Intervention Program will offer improved assistance to eligible low-income Missourians.

The Energy Crisis Prevention Program, which is part of the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), assists households when their energy source has been shut

off or is at risk of disconnection. The program pays the minimum amount needed on the fuel bill to get the household out of crisis. However, starting this winter, the program will pledge the maximum disconnect amount (up to \$800) toward an eligible participant's owed balance.

Parson said about the improvement to the program, "Since many Missourians remain in crisis for subsequent months, paying only the minimum to keep a low-income household out of crisis tends to prolong the situation. Now, we can make it faster and easier to resolve a household's crisis situation."

In FY2020, Missouri provided \$78.6 million in LIHEAP assistance to over 108,000 households. In addition to meeting the income criteria, low-income Missourians must also meet the following criteria to be eligible for winter heating assistance through LIHEAP:

Be responsible for paying home heating costs,
Have \$3,000 or less in bank accounts, retirement accounts, or investments, and
Be a U.S. citizen or legally admitted for permanent residence.

It is very important for low-income Missourians who have received a disconnect notice or know a disconnect notice is coming to get help now to prevent service disconnection at a later date. To learn more about the LIHEAP program, visit <https://mydss.mo.gov/energy-assistance>.





I am in the decision making process on the marriage bill. I'll let you know asap if I refile that one.

Here are some others - would you have anything to do with these?

1) Establishing the Governor's Patriotism Advisory Commission - a temporary commission under DESE of up to 20 members for a period of two years, appointed by the Governor who will advise the Governor on how best

to instill patriotism into public school curriculum for future generations. This is based upon President Trump's 1776 Commission but without an EO to establish it.

2) The Fleeing Motorist Act - Removing liability for motorists who are caught in a riot or "Protest" in their vehicles if the driver has reason to believe they or their passengers lives are in danger or are in danger of personal injury. Florida recently enacted something similar.

3) The Protection of Peaceful Protest Act - If you are convicted of rioting or looting, you lose government benefits for a period (unemployment insurance, medicaid, for instance).

4) The First Responders Protection Act - Would do a few things. 1) Upon request of the police officer, make it mandatory for a county clerk or assessor to redact their personally identifying information from public databases like property searches, tax records, etc. 2) Make doxing a police officer a class A Misdemeanor (if not already). 4) Anyone who assaults a first responder (firefighter, police officer, EMT) loses their government benefits, like medicaid, unemployment, for a period of time.

5) I don't have a name for it yet, but I'd like a bill that would make it illegal for any individual or organization to bring suit against another individual, farmer or business on behalf of "nature" or "earth." Ohio passed something similar this year.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section A. Section 650.005, RSMo, is repealed and six new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 40.003, 41.005, 45.010, 45.020, 45.030, and 650.005, to read as follows:

40.003. As of December 31, 2021, the powers, duties, and functions vested in the office of the state judge advocate are transferred by type I transfer to the department of defense established under chapter 45.

41.005. As of December 31, 2021, the powers, duties, and functions vested in the office of adjutant general and the state militia are transferred by type I transfer to the department of defense established under chapter 45; provided, however, nothing herein shall be construed to interfere with the powers and duties of the governor as provided in Article IV, Section 6 of the Constitution of Missouri or this chapter.

45.010. There is hereby created a "Department of Defense" to be headed by the adjutant general appointed by the governor, by and with the advice and consent of the senate. All of the general provisions, definitions, and powers enumerated in section 1 of the Omnibus State Reorganization Act of 1974 shall apply to this department and its divisions, agencies, and personnel.

ROUGH DRAFT NO. 1

AN ACT

To amend chapter 161, RSMo, by adding thereto one new section relating to the patriotism advisory commission.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF MISSOURI,
AS FOLLOWS:

Section A. Chapter 161, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto one new section, to be known as section 161.710, to read as follows:

161.710. 1. There is hereby established the "Governor's Patriotism Advisory Commission" within the department of elementary and secondary education. The commission shall promote the implementation of education and awareness programs in this state to better enable a rising generation to understand the history and principles of the founding of the United States in the year 1776 and to strive "to form a more perfect Union".

2. The commission shall:

(1) Produce a report for the governor regarding the core principles of the American founding and how these principles may be understood to further enjoyment of "the blessings of liberty" and to promote our striving "to form a more perfect Union". The commission may solicit statements and contributions from intellectual and cultural figures in addition to the views of the commission members. The report shall be completed and publicly disseminated before August 28, 2022;

(2) Facilitate the development and implementation of a "Governor's Patriot Award" to recognize student knowledge of the

1 American founding, including knowledge about the Founders, the
2 Declaration of Independence, the Constitutional Convention, and
3 the great soldiers and battles of the American Revolutionary War;

4 (3) Advise state departments and agencies with regard to
5 efforts of the departments and agencies to ensure patriotic
6 education is provided to the public at state parks, battlefields,
7 monuments, museums, installations, landmarks, cemeteries, and
8 other places important to the American Revolution and the
9 American founding as appropriate and consistent with applicable
10 law. As used in this subdivision, "patriotic education" means
11 the presentation of the history of the American founding and
12 foundational principles, the examination of how the United States
13 has grown closer to those principles throughout its history, and
14 the explanation of why commitment to America's aspirations is
15 beneficial and justified;

16 (4) Advise state departments and agencies on prioritizing
17 the American founding in state grants and initiatives and as
18 appropriate and consistent with applicable law; and

19 (5) Facilitate, advise upon, and promote other activities
20 to support public knowledge and patriotic education on the
21 American Revolution and the American founding as appropriate and
22 consistent with applicable law.

23 3. The commission shall be composed of a number of members
24 as determined and appointed by the governor and shall meet within
25 one hundred twenty days after the members are appointed. The
26 governor shall select a chair and a vice chair from among the
27 members. The members of the commission shall serve without

1 compensation but shall be entitled to reimbursement for travel
2 expenses incurred in the performance of official duties.

3 4. An executive director designated by the commissioner of
4 education shall coordinate the work of the commission. The chair
5 and vice chair shall cooperate with the executive director to
6 convene regular meetings of the commission, determine the
7 commission's agenda, and direct the commission's work consistent
8 with this section.

9 5. The department of elementary and secondary education
10 shall provide funding and administrative support for the
11 commission to the extent permitted by law and subject to the
12 availability of appropriations.

13 6. The commission shall terminate on August 28, 2023,
14 unless extended by the governor.

Hello Mr Carroll,

I have already pre-filed the bill, yes. It will not go before a committee unless or until it is referred to one, probably sometime in January or early February as the process normally goes.

I filed the Fleeing Motorist Protection Act to ensure that motorists who are trapped in their vehicle during a riot have a legal right to flight without being civilly and criminally liable for self-defense. If your grandparents are caught in a mob and are being threatened, they shouldn't be held liable for inadvertently hitting a rioter if they flee the scene in order to save those in the car from physical danger. That said, the bill does not change our laws on vehicular assault nor excuse gross negligence.

While I don't know how many of these specific situations have led to civil litigation, as the media rarely covers anything more than whether or not the motorist is criminally charged, there is currently no protection from civil liability for motorists who are guilty of nothing more than an attempt to flee a dangerous or life threatening situation that they are not responsible for creating. As a legislator, it is my responsibility to ensure the government protects my constituents, and I try to take a proactive approach whenever possible.

process will help connect Missourians with more avenues to receive a vaccine. This will not only provide support for Missouri citizens but also help our team determine where the greatest demands for vaccines exist throughout the state.”

The new navigator site allows residents to indicate their desire to be vaccinated. They will then need to answer questions to determine their eligibility based on the state’s priority phases.

Registrants will be notified upon activation of each phase and alerted when they become eligible. Individuals will then be able to seek vaccination from their health care provider if they have vaccines available or view mass vaccination events and other providers in their area.

In addition to helping individuals register for a vaccine, the Missouri Vaccine Navigator will remind registrants when it is time to schedule their second dose. Both vaccines currently authorized for use require two doses, and the second dose is critical to ensure individual and community protection.

Those with online accessibility issues are encouraged to call the COVID-19 hotline at 877-435-8411 for registration assistance. Language translation and other services are available to callers.

Missouri House Approves Kratom Consumer Protection Act ([HB 350](#))

Members of the Missouri House gave strong bipartisan support this week to legislation that will ensure the substance known as kratom can be safely purchased and used by adults in Missouri. Known as the Kratom Consumer Protection Act, the bill would create a regulatory framework to protect Missourians from kratom products that have been adulterated or contaminated with dangerous substances. The bill also would prevent the substance from being sold to those under the age of 18.

An herbal extract that comes from the leaves of an evergreen tree in Southeast Asia, kratom is often marketed as an energy booster, pain reliever, and even as an antidote for opioid withdrawal. Kratom is legal in Missouri and currently is not addressed in Missouri law.

“Unfortunately there are no rules and regulations to the safe consumption of kratom in the state of Missouri, and that means as the law stands now, it could be sold to children and, more dangerously, it could be adulterated with problematic substances,” said the bill’s sponsor.

The Kratom Consumer Protection Act would ensure kratom products are labeled accurately, and would prohibit dealers from selling kratom products that are contaminated with a dangerous non-kratom substance. The bill also states that dealers will not sell kratom products to anyone under the age of 18.

The bill's sponsor added, "The goal is to ensure that what is being sold in the marketplaces across Missouri is what it purports to be."

The bill now moves to the Senate for consideration.

House Moves to Streamline Vehicle Licensing Process for Farmers (HB 153)

Members of the Missouri House have approved legislation to cut bureaucratic red tape for farmers so they will have an easier time licensing their vehicles. The bill would allow the many farmers who own multiple vehicles to avoid numerous trips to the license bureau to license each vehicle.

The bill would create a system for Missourians who own multiple farm vehicles to have the vehicles placed on the same registration renewal schedule. All farm vehicles included in the fleet of a registered farm vehicle fleet owner would be registered during April or on a prorated basis. Farm vehicles registered under the bill would be issued a special license plate with the phrase "Farm Fleet Vehicle" and be issued multiyear license plates that do not require a renewal tab.

The sponsor said the bill will help farmers who own multiple vehicles to have a simplified process for vehicle licensing. He said, "It has been a real pain going to the license bureau every time one of those vehicles came up for licensing." He added that the bill gives farmers the option to "go to the license bureau one time a year in April, license all your vehicles at that one time, and you will be able to get a fleet plate that will be put on your vehicle for multiple years."

The bill now moves to the Senate for consideration.

Legislation Approved to Protect Missouri Farms from Unauthorized Inspections (HB 574)

Legislation is now on its way to the Senate that would protect Missouri agricultural facilities from other states and outside organizations that want to gain access to the facilities without legal authority. The bill is meant to protect producers from animal rights activists who may seek access under false pretenses, and is also designed to limit the spread of disease by ensuring only qualified inspectors are allowed into the facilities.

The sponsor said, "The reason this bill is needed is that oftentimes many of our agriculture producers do not know who has the right to come into their facility." The sponsor noted that several states have passed animal welfare or animal rights bills and that organizations from those states sometimes want to inspect the facilities of Missouri producers without the authority to do so.

The bill specifies the Missouri Department of Agriculture, the United States Department of Agriculture, the county sheriff and any other federal or Missouri state agency with statutory

or regulatory authority have exclusive authority to inspect the grounds or facilities in Missouri. Facilities include those used for the production of eggs, milk or other dairy products, raising of livestock, or the production or raising of dogs or other animals not used to produce any food product. The bill also allows a facility owner to request and allow groups outside those listed to inspect.

Supplemental Budget Bill Sent to Governor ([HB 16](#))

A supplemental spending plan that will provide assistance to renters is now on its way to the governor's desk to be signed into law. The Senate completed the work started by the House by passing the bill that appropriates more than \$324 million to the Missouri Housing Development Commission to help Missourians with rental assistance and utility assistance.

The bill allocates Missouri's share of a \$25 billion federal aid package for housing that was passed in December. Missouri's portion of the federal funds will be disbursed by the Missouri Housing Development Commission and can be used to pay landlords and utilities in arrears or to help keep renters current.

The aid can provide up to 12 months of rent and utility assistance, ongoing rent and utilities for up to three months, and help cover missed rent or utilities since March 1.

Representative Schnelting joined the Marc Cox Show this morning to discuss his Initiative Petition reform bill HJR5.

He presented this legislation to the Committee on Elections yesterday.

“Our Declaration of Independence states that ‘governments long established should not be change for light and transient causes.’ Yet nearly every election cycle we amend our state constitution through the IP process with issues that should be statutory, not constitutional” the Representative said.

These amendments are oftentimes pushed, and only successful because of, the immense amount of special interest money behind the measures –be it Democrat or Republican. But this is not a partisan issue. This abuse of the IP process needs to be curbed. The hearing on HJR5 this week was a good step in the right direction.

State Launches COVID-19 Vaccine Navigator

Missourians now have access to a secure registry tool that will help them to obtain the COVID-19 vaccine. The newly-created Missouri Vaccine Navigator can be reached online at MOStopsCovid.com/navigator.

Gov. Parson said, “Although vaccine supply nationwide is still quite limited, this registration process will help connect Missourians with more avenues to receive a vaccine. This will not only provide support for Missouri citizens but also help our team determine where the greatest demands for vaccines exist throughout the state.”

The new navigator site allows residents to indicate their desire to be vaccinated. They will then need to answer questions to determine their eligibility based on the state’s priority phases.

Registrants will be notified upon activation of each phase and alerted when they become eligible. Individuals will then be able to seek vaccination from their health care provider if they have vaccines available or view mass vaccination events and other providers in their area.

In addition to helping individuals register for a vaccine, the Missouri Vaccine Navigator will remind registrants when it is time to schedule their second dose. Both vaccines currently authorized for use require two doses, and the second dose is critical to ensure individual and community protection.

Missouri House Approves Kratom Consumer Protection Act ([HB 350](#))

Members of the Missouri House gave strong bipartisan support this week to legislation that will ensure the substance known as kratom can be safely purchased and used by adults in

Missouri. Known as the Kratom Consumer Protection Act, the bill would create a regulatory framework to protect Missourians from kratom products that have been adulterated or contaminated with dangerous substances. The bill also would prevent the substance from being sold to those under the age of 18.

An herbal extract that comes from the leaves of an evergreen tree in Southeast Asia, kratom is often marketed as an energy booster, pain reliever, and even as an antidote for opioid withdrawal. Kratom is legal in Missouri and currently is not addressed in Missouri law.

“Unfortunately there are no rules and regulations to the safe consumption of kratom in the state of Missouri, and that means as the law stands now, it could be sold to children and, more dangerously, it could be adulterated with problematic substances,” said the bill’s sponsor.

The Kratom Consumer Protection Act would ensure kratom products are labeled accurately, and would prohibit dealers from selling kratom products that are contaminated with a dangerous non-kratom substance. The bill also states that dealers will not sell kratom products to anyone under the age of 18.

The bill’s sponsor added, “The goal is to ensure that what is being sold in the marketplaces across Missouri is what it purports to be.”

The bill now moves to the Senate for consideration.

House Moves to Streamline Vehicle Licensing Process for Farmers (HB 153)

Members of the Missouri House have approved legislation to cut bureaucratic red tape for farmers so they will have an easier time licensing their vehicles. The bill would allow the many farmers who own multiple vehicles to avoid numerous trips to the license bureau to license each vehicle.

The bill would create a system for Missourians who own multiple farm vehicles to have the vehicles placed on the same registration renewal schedule. All farm vehicles included in the fleet of a registered farm vehicle fleet owner would be registered during April or on a prorated basis. Farm vehicles registered under the bill would be issued a special license plate with the phrase “Farm Fleet Vehicle” and be issued multiyear license plates that do not require a renewal tab.

The sponsor said the bill will help farmers who own multiple vehicles to have a simplified process for vehicle licensing. He said, “It has been a real pain going to the license bureau every time one of those vehicles came up for licensing.” He added that the bill gives farmers the option to “go to the license bureau one time a year in April, license all your vehicles at that one time, and you will be able to get a fleet plate that will be put on your vehicle for multiple years.”

The bill now moves to the Senate for consideration.

Legislation Approved to Protect Missouri Farms from Unauthorized Inspections (HB 574)

Legislation is now on its way to the Senate that would protect Missouri agricultural facilities from other states and outside organizations that want to gain access to the facilities without legal authority. The bill is meant to protect producers from animal rights activists who may seek access under false pretenses, and is also designed to limit the spread of disease by ensuring only qualified inspectors are allowed into the facilities.

The sponsor said, "The reason this bill is needed is that oftentimes many of our agriculture producers do not know who has the right to come into their facility." The sponsor noted that several states have passed animal welfare or animal rights bills and that organizations from those states sometimes want to inspect the facilities of Missouri producers without the authority to do so.

The bill specifies the Missouri Department of Agriculture, the United States Department of Agriculture, the county sheriff and any other federal or Missouri state agency with statutory or regulatory authority have exclusive authority to inspect the grounds or facilities in Missouri. Facilities include those used for the production of eggs, milk or other dairy products, raising of livestock, or the production or raising of dogs or other animals not used to produce any food product. The bill also allows a facility owner to request and allow groups outside those listed to inspect.

Supplemental Budget Bill Sent to Governor (HB 16)

A supplemental spending plan that will provide assistance to renters is now on its way to the governor's desk to be signed into law. The Senate completed the work started by the House by passing the bill that appropriates more than \$324 million to the Missouri Housing Development Commission to help Missourians with rental assistance and utility assistance.

The bill allocates Missouri's share of a \$25 billion federal aid package for housing that was passed in December. Missouri's portion of the federal funds will be disbursed by the Missouri Housing Development Commission and can be used to pay landlords and utilities in arrears or to help keep renters current.

The aid can provide up to 12 months of rent and utility assistance, ongoing rent and utilities for up to three months, and help cover missed rent or utilities since March 1.
