"We want our children to be taught to be proud of their history, and to be grateful for our priceless American heritage ... We put our trust in God, not government.


We believe in sovereignty, not globalism. And we believe in freedom, not socialism."

Dear Arizona House Members,

Please support **Senate Bill 1064** (SB 1064). This legislation incentivizes the participation and completion of reentry programs, reduces recidivism, and strengthens public safety in Arizona. SB 1064 would safely reduce incarceration rates by expanding earned release credits for individuals convicted of nonviolent offenses if they complete rehabilitative programming.

By comparison, Arizona is one of *only three states* that requires individuals convicted of nonviolent offenses as defined by state law to serve at least 85% of their sentences before becoming eligible for parole, with the exception of individuals convicted of drug possession offenses. In essence **forty-seven states, including Alabama, South Carolina, Texas, Utah, West Virginia, and Wyoming have more expansive earned credit eligibility laws than Arizona** for individuals in their prisons convicted of nonviolent crimes. These other states that have allowed incarcerated people to be released on parole after serving shorter percentages of their criminal sentences have seen *reductions in both their prison populations and violent crime rates as compared to Arizona*.

Specifically, SB 1064 increases earned release credits for individuals convicted of nonviolent offenses and incentivizes substance abuse, education, skills, and job training programs by allowing those convicted of drug offenses to earn an additional five days for every six days in prison with a total of up to 50% off of their sentence. In addition, those convicted of other nonviolent offenses can earn an additional two days for every six days in prison with a total of up to 33% off of their sentence for successfully completing meaningful programming or actively participating in a qualified work program for at least six months.

Additionally, a floor amendment to SB 1064 would apply the bill to the current drug offender prison population that has already completed or is enrolled in reentry programs and would be prospective only for those convicted of certain nonviolent offenses. The bill also requires victim notification of their earliest release date and adds reporting requirements to better track the success of the earned release credits.

Ultimately, this bill will reduce the length of time certain individuals serve in prison by incentivizing participation in substance abuse programming, along with education and job training programs that have been demonstrated to enhance public safety by lowering recidivism rates. The ALEC model *Resolution in Support of Reentry Programs* highlights that of empowering individuals and providing for second chances and redemption while simultaneously promoting the creation of sound reentry policies that promote public safety by reducing recidivism rates. Ultimately, roughly 96% of incarcerated individuals will be released from prison and smart reentry policies will reduce recidivism rates and make the public safer.

Therefore, please vote in favor of **SB 1064**.

ALEC Action urges you to support language in HB 2682 that would prevent local governments from creating a confusing and economically damaging patchwork of local regulations, such as the discussed ban on flavored tobacco products in Phoenix.

While the Phoenix City Council may be well-intentioned, its consideration of a ban on the sale of flavored tobacco products to adults over the age of 21 is misguided. These types of products are consistently under robust review by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), which recently raised the federal minimum age for sale of tobacco products from 18 to 21 at the end of 2019.

We feel it is important to understand the role of federalism and the proper balance of power between the federal, state, and local governments. Local governments can better serve their constituents by focusing on budgets, transparency, and delivery of essential services. HB 2682 would prevent local elected officials from becoming regulatory agents. In Florida, for example, Governor Ron DeSantis recently signed Senate Bill 1080, which recognizes that regulatory power should not rest with local governments in the Sunshine State.

Absent these reforms contained in HB 2682, local businesses will suffer. In the words of Bob Aujla, owner of 12 convenience stores in Phoenix, "If the Phoenix City Council votes to implement a flavored tobacco ban, it will only further decimate small, locally owned businesses that have struggled to stay afloat in recent months."

For these reasons, ALEC Action urges members of the Arizona House to support the limited local preemption in HB 2682, which will aid small businesses.

ALEC *Action* urges you to support efforts that would allow Arizonans to keep more of their hard-earned paychecks. For instance, by reducing personal income tax rates to a flat 2.5% for most Arizonans and capping the rate paid by high earners at 4.5%, the state economy will be poised for long-term growth and to attract new businesses and investment. **This would also improve Arizona's economic outlook ranking from 13th to 3rd best in the nation.**

Following the narrow passage of Proposition 208 in November, Arizona's top marginal personal income tax rate increased from 4.5% to 8% – a **78% increase** – for individuals earning at least \$250,000 per year. 

Your status as a right-to-work state is being challenged in Congress.

H.R. 842, Congress' "Protecting the Right to Organize (PRO) Act," is a direct attack on the principles of federalism and state autonomy by preempting the laws of your state. Right-to-work is a key element of your state's economic competitiveness and is one of the fifteen factors the ALEC [Rich States, Poor States](#) report annually measures.

Dear Members of the Arizona House of Representatives,

ALEC Action writes to encourage you to **oppose House Bill 2005**. The proposal would hamper the innovation economy and would result in harm to consumers by reducing the number of apps available to them.

Apps have offered great value to the national and state economies, including the economy of Arizona and have been of particular value during the COVID-19 pandemic. Citizens can request transportation, reserve overnight stays in hotels and homes, purchase needed supplies, receive health care, and attend school through online services and apps. **HB 2005 would reduce the number of options available to Arizona citizens by requiring smartphone and electronic device manufacturers to accept apps that have not gone through rigorous security vetting and much more.**

HB 2005 would **interfere with the free market** and its ability to drive innovation in the states, which in the internet space is **characterized by vibrant change**. Public policy should always remain neutral with respect to existing and emerging business models and technologies, which includes the contracts between platforms, manufacturers, developers, and innovators. **Governments should avoid requiring specific contractual terms or implementing policies that would lock in specific relationships between innovators and those who can help promote their ideas.**

With respect to contracts between private parties, ALEC acknowledges that "a privately negotiated contract...is the fundamental basis for doing business in the United States" and that "the U.S. Constitution and most state constitutions specifically prohibit impairment of contracts freely and openly entered into by the parties." Consequently, as ALEC policy makes clear, its members **"oppose the enactment of laws that interfere with private business agreements freely and openly negotiated and entered into by parties."**

The text of HB 2005 would apply to both future and existing contracts between developers and smartphone operating system manufacturers. Providers large and small, national and regional—from Uber, Lyft, Airbnb, to app developers in Arizona—have existing contracts with Apple and Google. **HB 2005 would impair the obligations of those terms by substituting exclusivity and payment clauses into them.**

HB 2005 reflects concerns raised in a couple private antitrust suits, such as [Apple v. Pepper](#) and [Epic Games v. Apple](#). The suits ask courts to declare Apple's contractual provisions requiring developers to work through the App Store and use certain payment systems for in-app purchases as violations of antitrust law. The suits are likely to fail, since Apple developed the iPhone and iPad and has the right to control both the iOS and access to the devices as its property. Not to mention, both Apple and Google primarily use contractual terms to ensure that bad actors cannot install malware or software with back doors onto consumers' devices.

The suits, along with HB 2005 ignore contracts signed by developers and are trying to change the antitrust debate in an effort to reign in so-called big tech. Antitrust should

never be used political tool, including **legislation seeking to achieve the same end as litigation**. Antitrust policies should not be used in response to, or to control, the procedures social media platforms use to moderate or display content. Any antitrust suits or legislative proposals should be based solely on a bona fide violation of antitrust laws, which require proof of economic injury to consumers through a reduction in competition. Competition and disruptive innovation are the best protectors of consumers. Concerns about the dominance of a single online platform are nothing new. This does not mean that tech companies should be immune from antitrust laws, but that "if a company's dominance... can be shown to harm consumer welfare, existing antitrust law should be enforced. **But there is no need to rewrite antitrust doctrine to protect online speech, and doing so will likely harm consumers.**

**Re:** Support HCR 2021 to Protect the Electoral College and Oppose the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact

Dear Arizona House Members,

I urge you to support [House Concurrent Resolution 2021](#) (HCR 2021) and to maintain the legislation's impact by retaining the provisions that reference the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact (NPV). HCR 2021 serves dual purposes: it reaffirms the Electoral College *and* articulates the existential threat that NPV poses to this American institution. The Electoral College, as our founders intended, forces presidential candidates to expand their popularity beyond big cities. Those seeking the highest office earn national credibility by courting support across the country – in rural and urban locales – broadening their appeal and expanding their coalition. This system is inclusive and dynamic, and as Arizonans witnessed firsthand, battlegrounds shift as both parties work to win over more Americans.

America's Constitutional Framers considered and roundly rejected the direct election of US presidents. Their concerns ranged from avoiding a "tyranny of the majority" to a desire to ensure that the interests of less populous states were not eclipsed by those of larger ones. James Madison also observed that "turbulence and contention" plague democracies and that they are "incompatible with personal security [and] the rights of property." That is why our Founding Fathers entrusted to us a republic, not a direct democracy.

The instructions for the establishment of the Electoral College are contained in Article II, Section 1 of the US Constitution, and amending the document should be the only way to change how Americans elect their president. However, instead of pursuing a constitutional amendment, NPV attempts an end run around the Electoral College, bypassing our most hallowed body of law, the US Constitution, and effectively instituting a popular vote system. The NPV compact already has enough states to equal a startling 196 electoral votes – this movement is almost 75% of the way to electing the next President of the United States.

The Electoral College deserves our protection and support. It is ingenious, illustrating our Founding Fathers' wisdom and foresight and has been instrumental in preserving our country's 220-year history of peaceful transfers of power. Arizona has a long and rich history of state sovereignty leadership and needs to lead again to preserve one of the most important institutions of federalism – the Electoral College. Please vote in favor of **HCR 2021**, leaving intact the sections that describe the corrosive impact that NPV would have on America's electoral processes.

Please support [House Bill 2713](#) (HB 2713). This legislation incentivizes the participation and completion of reentry programs, reduces recidivism, and strengthens public safety in Arizona. HB 2713 would safely reduce incarceration rates by expanding earned release credits for individuals convicted of nonviolent offenses if they complete rehabilitative programming.

By comparison, Arizona is one of only three states that requires individuals convicted of nonviolent offenses as defined by state law to serve at least 85% of their sentences before becoming eligible for parole, with the exception of individuals convicted of drug possession offenses. In essence **forty-seven states, including Alabama, South Carolina, Texas, Utah, West Virginia, and Wyoming have more expansive earned credit eligibility laws than Arizona** for individuals in their prisons convicted of nonviolent crimes. These other states that have allowed incarcerated people to be released on parole after serving shorter percentages of their criminal sentences have seen reductions in both their prison populations and violent crime rates as compared to Arizona.

Specifically, HB 2713 increases earned release credits for individuals convicted of nonviolent offenses and incentivizes substance abuse, education, skills, and job training programs by allowing those convicted of drug offenses to earn an additional five days for every six days in prison with a total of up to 50% off of their sentence. In addition, those convicted of other nonviolent offenses can earn an additional two days for every six days in prison with a total of up to 33% off of their sentence for successfully completing meaningful programming or actively participating in a qualified work program for at least six months.

Additionally, HB 2713 applies to the current prison population that has already completed or is enrolled in reentry programs and requires additional victim notification of their earliest release date. It also adds reporting requirements to better track the success of additional earned release credits.

Ultimately, this bill will reduce the length of time certain individuals serve in prison by incentivizing participation in substance abuse programming, along with education and job training programs that have been demonstrated to enhance public safety by lowering recidivism rates. The ALEC model [Resolution in Support of Reentry Programs](#) supports the proposition of empowering individuals and providing for second chances and redemption while simultaneously promoting the creation of sound reentry policies that promote public safety by reducing recidivism rates. Ultimately, roughly 96% of all incarcerated individuals will be released from prison and smart reentry policies will help reduce recidivism rates and make the public safer.

Therefore, please vote in favor of **HB 2713**.

Dear Members of the Arizona House Commerce Committee,

ALEC Action writes to encourage you to **oppose House Bill 2005**. The proposal would hamper the innovation economy and would result in harm to consumers by reducing the number of apps available to them.

Apps have offered great value to the national and state economies, including the economy of Arizona and have been of particular value during the COVID-19 pandemic. Citizens can request transportation, reserve overnight stays in hotels and homes, purchase needed supplies, receive health care, and attend school through online services and apps. **HB 2005 would reduce the number of options available to Arizona citizens by requiring smartphone and electronic device manufacturers to accept apps that have not gone through rigorous security vetting and much more.**

HB 2005 would **interfere with the free market** and its ability to drive innovation in the states, which in the internet space is **characterized by vibrant change**. Public policy should always remain neutral with respect to existing and emerging business models and technologies, which includes the contracts between platforms, manufacturers, developers, and innovators. **Governments should avoid requiring specific contractual terms or implementing policies that would lock in specific relationships between innovators and those who can help promote their ideas.**

With respect to contracts between private parties, ALEC acknowledges that "a privately negotiated contract...is the fundamental basis for doing business in the United States" and that "the U.S. Constitution and most state constitutions specifically prohibit impairment of contracts freely and openly entered into by the parties." Consequently, as ALEC policy makes clear, its members **"oppose the enactment of laws that interfere with private business agreements freely and openly negotiated and entered into by parties."**

The text of HB 2005 would apply to both future and existing contracts between developers and smartphone operating system manufacturers. Providers large and small, national and regional—from Uber, Lyft, Airbnb, to app developers in Arizona—have existing contracts with Apple and Google. **HB 2005 would impair the obligations of those terms by substituting exclusivity and payment clauses into them.**

HB 2005 reflects concerns raised in a couple private antitrust suits, such as [Apple v. Pepper](#) and [Epic Games v. Apple](#). The suits ask courts to declare Apple's contractual provisions requiring developers to work through the App Store and use certain payment systems for in-app purchases as violations of antitrust law. The suits are likely to fail, since Apple developed the iPhone and iPad and has the right to control both the iOS and access to the devices as its property. Not to mention, both Apple and Google primarily use contractual terms to ensure that bad actors cannot install malware or software with back doors onto consumers' devices.

The suits, along with HB 2005 ignore contracts signed by developers and are trying to change the antitrust debate in an effort to reign in so-called big tech. Antitrust should never be used political tool, including **legislation seeking to achieve the same end as litigation**. Antitrust policies should not be used in response to, or to control, the procedures social media platforms use to moderate or display content. Any antitrust suits or legislative proposals should be based solely on a bona fide violation of antitrust laws, which require proof of economic injury to consumers through a reduction in competition. Competition and disruptive innovation are the best protectors of consumers. Concerns about the dominance of a single online platform are nothing new. This does not mean that tech companies should be immune from antitrust laws, but that "if a company's dominance... can be shown to harm consumer welfare, existing antitrust law should be enforced. **But there is no need to rewrite antitrust doctrine to protect online speech, and doing so will likely harm consumers.**

Dear Arizona Leaders,

ALEC *Action* urges you to support efforts that would allow Arizonans to keep more of their hard-earned paychecks. For instance, by reducing personal income tax rates to a flat 2.5% for most Arizonans and capping the rate paid by high earners at 4.5%, the state economy will be poised for long-term growth and to attract new businesses and investment. **This would also improve Arizona's economic outlook ranking from 13th to 3rd best in the nation.**

Following the narrow passage of Proposition 208 in November, Arizona's top marginal personal income tax rate increased from 4.5% to 8% – a **78% increase** – for individuals earning at least \$250,000 per year. As a result, **Arizona now has the 8th highest top marginal personal income tax rate in the nation.** This new, higher rate far exceeds the top rate imposed by neighbors Nevada (0%), Colorado (4.55%), Utah (4.95%), and even New Mexico (5.9%).

Neighboring California, which imposes the highest top personal income tax rate of any state at 13.3%, has just lost a congressional seat for the **first time in state history**, as thousands have fled the Golden State in search of economic opportunity.

Prior to the passage of Prop 208, Arizona was the third largest recipient of former Californians, behind Nevada and Texas, with nearly **\$12 billion** in annual adjusted gross income (AGI) coming to Arizona from California alone since 1992. **With high income tax rates, Arizona's ability to attract new residents and investment has been substantially diminished.**

According to studies that differentiate between various forms of taxation, **income taxes are the most harmful to long-term economic growth.** In fact, Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) **scholars found** a 1% decrease in income tax burden led to an expected 0.25% to 1% increase in gross domestic product (GDP) per capita between 1971 and 2004.

Because of income tax increases, The Grand Canyon State has just fallen out of the top 10 states for economic outlook to its lowest ranking ever (13th) in the new 2021 edition of the **Rich States, Poor States: ALEC Laffer State Economic Competitiveness Index.** If the substantial tax relief is approved in the budget, **Arizona would have the 3rd best overall economic outlook among the 50 states.**

While no budget is perfect, substantive tax reform can transform a state economy and make Arizona a better place to raise a family and do business. **ALEC *Action* encourages Governor Ducey and members of the Arizona Legislature to reposition Arizona for economic growth by providing tax relief and lowering the income tax.**



AB-5 in California was not even right for Californians, with a multitude of exemptions, carve outs, clarifying bills and propositions that are all missing from the PRO Act language. Dear Members of the Arizona House of Representatives,

ALEC Action writes to encourage you to **oppose House Bill 2005**. The proposal would hamper the innovation economy and would result in harm to consumers by reducing the number of apps available to them.

Apps have offered great value to the national and state economies, including the economy of Arizona and have been of particular value during the COVID-19 pandemic. Citizens can request transportation, reserve overnight stays in hotels and homes, purchase needed supplies, receive health care, and attend school through online services and apps. **HB 2005 would reduce the number of options available to Arizona citizens** by requiring smartphone and electronic device manufacturers to accept apps that have not gone through rigorous security vetting and much more.

HB 2005 would **interfere with the free market** and its ability to drive innovation in the states, which in the internet space is **characterized by vibrant change**. Public policy should always remain neutral with respect to existing and emerging business models and technologies, which includes the contracts between platforms, manufacturers, developers, and innovators. **Governments should avoid requiring specific contractual terms or implementing policies that would lock in specific relationships between innovators and those who can help promote their ideas.**

With respect to contracts between private parties, ALEC acknowledges that “a privately negotiated contract...is the fundamental basis for doing business in the United States” and that “the U.S. Constitution and most state constitutions specifically prohibit impairment of contracts freely and openly entered into by the parties.” Consequently, as ALEC policy makes clear, its members “**oppose the enactment of laws that interfere with private business agreements freely and openly negotiated and entered into by parties.**”

The text of HB 2005 would apply to both future and existing contracts between developers and smartphone operating system manufacturers. Providers large and small, national and regional—from Uber, Lyft, Airbnb, to app developers in Arizona—have existing contracts with Apple and Google. **HB 2005 would impair the obligations of those terms by substituting exclusivity and payment clauses into them.**

HB 2005 reflects concerns raised in a couple private antitrust suits, such as [Apple v. Pepper](#) and [Epic Games v. Apple](#). The suits ask courts to declare Apple’s contractual provisions requiring developers to work through the App Store and use certain payment systems for in-app purchases as violations of antitrust law. The suits are likely to fail, since Apple developed the iPhone and iPad and has the right to control both the iOS and access to the devices as its property. Not to mention, both Apple and Google primarily use contractual terms to ensure that bad actors cannot install malware or software with back doors onto consumers’ devices.

The suits, along with HB 2005 ignore contracts signed by developers and are trying to change the antitrust debate in an effort to reign in so-called big tech. Antitrust should

never be used political tool, including **legislation seeking to achieve the same end as litigation**. Antitrust policies should not be used in response to, or to control, the procedures social media platforms use to moderate or display content. Any antitrust suits or legislative proposals should be based solely on a bona fide violation of antitrust laws, which require proof of economic injury to consumers through a reduction in competition. Competition and disruptive innovation are the best protectors of consumers. Concerns about the dominance of a single online platform are nothing new. This does not mean that tech companies should be immune from antitrust laws, but that "if a company's dominance... can be shown to harm consumer welfare, existing antitrust law should be enforced. **But there is no need to rewrite antitrust doctrine to protect online speech, and doing so will likely harm consumers.**
