Dear Hart Wood:

This letter responds to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request dated January 19, 2022, to the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) The Privacy Office and transferred to the DHS Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (CRCL) on January 21, 2022, seeking:

1. Complaints submitted to the Office of Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (CRCL) concerning migrant expulsions under Title 42, including, but not limited to, the conduct of employees of any DHS component or treatment of migrants under the policy.
2. Any short form complaints opened by CRCL in response to information submitted by DHS components or external entities concerning migrant expulsions under Title 42.

(Date Range for Record Search: From 3/01/2020 To date of the search).

The processing of your request identified certain materials that will be released to you. Portions not released are being withheld pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552. Please refer to the Applicable Exemptions list at the end of this letter that identifies the authority for withholding the exempt material, which is indicated by a mark appearing in the block next to the exemption. Exemptions

Exemption (b)(1): Records that contain information that is classified for national security purposes.

Exemption (b)(2): Records that are related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency.

Exemption (b)(3): Allows for the withholding of information prohibited from disclosure by another federal statute provided that one of two disjunctive requirements are met: the statute either "(A)(i) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on the issue, or (A)(ii) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld."

Exemption (b)(4): Records that contain trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person that is privileged or confidential.

Exemption (b)(5): Inter- or intra-agency records that are normally privileged in the civil discovery context. The three most frequently invoked privileges are the deliberative process privilege, the attorney work-product privilege, and the attorney-client privilege:

- Deliberative process privilege – Under the deliberative process privilege, disclosure of these records would injure the quality of future agency decisions by discouraging the open and frank policy discussions between subordinates and superiors.
- Attorney work-product privilege – Records prepared by or at the direction of a FinCEN attorney.
- Attorney-client privilege – Records of communications between an attorney and his/her client relating to a matter for which the client has sought legal advice, as well as facts divulged by client to attorney and any opinions given by attorney based on these.

Exemption (b)(6): Records that contain identifying information that applies to a particular individual when the disclosure of such information "would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy." This requires the balancing of the public's right to disclosure against the individual's right to privacy.

Exemption (b)(7)(A): Records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that production of such law enforcement records or information...could reasonably be expected to interfere with law enforcement proceedings.

Exemption (b)(7)(C): Records containing law enforcement information when disclosure "could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy" based upon the traditional recognition of strong privacy interests ordinarily appropriated in law enforcement records.

Exemption (b)(7)(E): Records compiled for law enforcement purposes, the release of which would disclose techniques and/or procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law.

CBP provided an I-44 listing (b) (5) (b) (7)(E) and other individuals apprehended with her. The I-44 narrative states: "On July 4, 2020 at approximately 12:20 a.m., Border Patrol Agents (BPA) (b) (5) (b) (7)(E) and (b) (5) (b) (7)(E) encountered ten subjects that illegally entered into the United States at the International Border near Sasabe, Arizona, at a place other than as designated by the Secretary of Homeland Security. The subjects were taken into custody and transported to the Sasabe Forward Operating Base (Sasabe, Arizona) for processing using the e3/IAFIS Systems. They appeared to have no illness or injuries. The family is living temporarily in hiding sharing a tent inside Movimiento Juvenil 2000, a severely overcrowded nonprofit shelter in Tijuana's Zona Norte. Their housing is unstable and dangerous, and they have already been robbed of their possessions in the shelter. The family lives in constant fear that they will be the next victims and will be kidnapped, tortured, and murdered. The fear in their lives is so palpable that the children do not leave the shelter to attend school. The result has been a severe decline in mental health for all family members, requiring the in-patient hospitalization of the complainant. A humanitarian parole request was submitted to CBP officers at the San Ysidro Port of Entry on October 10, 2021. CBP replied with a short denial on October 19, 2021. The attorney included an executed G-28 and supporting documentation. The advocate alleges that the denial of the request for humanitarian parole is an abuse of discretion and that there are strong humanitarian interests in granting parole. (b) (5) (b) (7)(E) has uncontrolled epilepsy, and has suffered at least 7 seizures in the last year. Her 9-year-old son Jefferson is a life-long asthmatic, a serious and potentially life threatening condition for which he was hospitalized for 2 months when he was only 2 years old. Comprehensive medical examinations of the complainant and her son were each completed in October, 2021 by a US trained family medicine physician, licensed in the state of California, who serves as a volunteer with the Refugee Health Alliance. The doctor concluded that, in light of the current state of healthcare provision in Tijuana, the barriers to obtaining quality medical care, and the complexity of the complainant's medical condition, the complainant does not have access in Mexico to the treatments she urgently needs to avert "decompensation and subsequent poor health outcomes including disability and death." The doctor also concluded that Jefferson is at "great risk", and that he needs ready, consistent access to vital inhaled medications, and specialty care from qualified medical professionals that is unavailable to him in Mexico. The attorney added that "the family lives in constant fear of a repeat kidnapping and violent, possibly lethal abuse." Last August, the family was kidnapped, blind-folded, tied up and forced into a black car as they tried to make their way to Guadalajara. They were drugged, beaten, and separated for a month. During this period, the complainant was hit multiple times and forced to take unknown pills. Her sons were injected with unknown substances that made them sleepy. Her husband was badly beaten and repeatedly kicked, and continues to suffer from spinal injuries resulting from the abuse making it very painful and difficult to move. An initial humanitarian parole request was submitted to CBP officers at the San Ysidro Port of Entry on November 5, 2021. CBP replied with a short denial on December 2, 2021. The attorney included an executed G-28 and supporting documentation. The advocate alleges that the denial of the request for humanitarian parole is an abuse of discretion and that there are strong humanitarian interests in granting parole. In Tapachula she was allegedly raped at gunpoint in multiple different instances by men who targeted her because of her sexual orientation and because she is Black and therefore more visibly vulnerable. Police would not help her without a bribe, and she could not receive help at the hospital due to the language barrier. As a result of being raped, she became pregnant. The family is in need of shelter and medical resources. An initial humanitarian parole request was submitted to CBP officers at the San Ysidro Port of Entry on October 27, 2021. CBP replied with a short denial on October 29, 2021. The attorney included an executed G-28 and supporting documentation. The advocate alleges that the denial of the request for humanitarian parole is an abuse of discretion and that there are strong humanitarian interests in granting parole. According to the attorney, the family has a willing sponsor ready to receive them. The complainant stated that the subject has been separated from her son (b) (1), (b) (6) (no alien number or age provided) for over three weeks. The two fled to Mexico from their home in El Salvador and tried to seek refuge; however, they have been the victims of constant anti-migrant and anti-LGBTQ+ discrimination, violence, and extortion. In Tapachula, they were robbed at knife-point by gang members who took their passports and all their money. They were afraid to file a police report because the attackers threatened to kill them if they went to the police. Due to this attack, it was unsafe for them to stay in Tapachula so they fled to Piedras Negras. Shortly after arriving in Piedras Negras, (mother and son) found a small room to rent. One day while they were home, strangers knocked on their door. When they didn't open the door, several Mexican policemen forced the door open and entered. The police ransacked the room and took all the money they found. They beat (the son) and told him and (the mother) that they did not allow migrants in Piedras Negras. They also said they would not permit gay people in their town. Both (b) (1), (b) (6) and (b) (1), (b) (6) were severely traumatized by the experience. Rosa feared for her son's life and believed him to be in immediate danger following the attack, so she allowed him to cross to the US without her in an attempt to save his life. (The mother) originally hoped that (her son) could stay with an uncle, but the uncle changed his mind and did not receive (b) (1), (b) (6). Since they have no other family in the US, (b) (1), (b) (6) has had to remain in an ORR shelter. (b) (1), (b) (6) has a willing sponsor ready to receive her and her son in Maryland. She has no criminal history and wishes to seek asylum. I respectfully request that she be allowed to enter and be placed into immigration proceedings. A cardiologist later diagnosed her with an irregular heart rhythm and started her on medication to control both her heart rate and her blood pressure. Since she was forced to leave El Salvador, however, she has been unable to follow-up with her cardiologist or refill her medications. Both children are experiencing painful rashes for which they were prescribed cream ointments.
