HOFFMAN FLOOR AMENDMENT
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AMENDMENTS TO _.B. ____
(Reference to printed bill)

1 Section 1. Section 16-442, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to
2 read:

3 16-442. Committee approval; adoption of vote tabulating
4 equipment; experimental use; emergency

5 A. The secretary of state shall appoint a committee of three
6 persons, to consist of a member of the engineering college at one of the
7 universities, a member of the state bar of Arizona and one person familiar
8 with voting processes in the state, no more than two of whom shall be of
9 the same political party, and at least one of whom shall have at least five
10 years of experience with and shall be able to render an opinion based on
11 knowledge of, training in or education in electronic voting systems,
12 procedures and security. The committee shall investigate and test the
13 various types of vote recording or tabulating machines or devices that may
14 be used under this article. The committee shall submit its recommendations
15 to the secretary of state who shall make final adoption of the type or
16 types, make or makes, model or models to be certified for use in this
17 state. The committee shall serve without compensation.

18 B. Machines or devices used at any election for federal, state or
19 county offices may only be certified for use in this state and may only be
20 used in this state if they comply with the help America vote act of 2002
21 and if those machines or devices have been tested and approved by a
22 laboratory that is accredited pursuant to the help America vote act of
23 2002.

1 C. After consultation with the committee prescribed by subsection A
2 of this section, the secretary of state shall adopt standards that specify
3 the criteria for loss of certification for equipment that was used at any
4 election for federal, state or county offices and that was previously
5 certified for use in this state. FOR ANY ELECTION AUDIT CONDUCTED BY THE
6 LEGISLATIVE OR JUDICIAL BRANCH THAT USES CERTIFIED ELECTION EQUIPMENT, THE
7 AUDIT IS NOT A BASIS FOR DECERTIFYING THAT EQUIPMENT. On loss of
8 certification, machines or devices used at any election may not be used for
9 any election for federal, state or county offices in this state unless
10 recertified for use in this state.

11 D. The secretary of state may revoke the certification of any voting
12 system or device for use in a federal, state or county election in this
13 state or may prohibit for up to five years the purchase, lease or use of
14 any voting system or device leased, installed or used by a person or firm
15 in connection with a federal, state or county election in this state, or
16 both, if either of the following occurs:

17 1. The person or firm installs, uses or permits the use of a voting
18 system or device that is not certified for use or approved for experimental
19 use in this state pursuant to this section.

20 2. The person or firm uses or includes hardware, firmware or
21 software in a version that is not certified for use or approved for
22 experimental use pursuant to this section in a certified voting system or
23 device.

24 E. The governing body of a city or town or the board of directors of
25 an agricultural improvement district may adopt for use in elections any
26 kind of electronic voting system or vote tabulating device approved by the
27 secretary of state, and thereupon the voting or marking device and vote
28 tabulating equipment may be used at any or all elections for voting,
29 recording and counting votes cast at an election.

30 F. The secretary of state or the governing body may provide for the
31 experimental use of a voting system or device without a final adoption of

1 the voting system or device, and its use at the election is as valid as if
2 the machines had been permanently adopted.

3 G. After consultation with the committee prescribed by subsection A
4 of this section, the secretary of state may approve for emergency use an
5 upgrade or modification to a voting system or device that is certified for
6 use in this state if the governing body establishes in an open meeting that
7 the election cannot be conducted without the emergency certification. Any
8 emergency certification shall be limited to no more than six months. At
9 the conclusion of the certification period the voting system or device
10 shall be decertified and unavailable for future use unless certified in
11 accordance with this section.

12 Sec. 2. Title 16, chapter 4, article 6, Arizona Revised Statutes, is
13 amended by adding section 16-504, to read:

14 16-504. Antifraud ballot paper; vendor certification;
15 antifraud measures

16 NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER STATUTE, ANY VENDOR THAT PROVIDES FRAUD
17 COUNTERMEASURES THAT ARE CONTAINED IN AND ON THE PAPER USED FOR BALLOTS
18 SHALL BE ISO 27001 CERTIFIED, ISO 17025 CERTIFIED OR ISO 9001:2015
19 CERTIFIED. BALLOT FRAUD COUNTERMEASURES SHALL INCLUDE THE USE OF AT LEAST
20 THREE OF THE FOLLOWING:

- 21 1. UNIQUE, CONTROLLED-SUPPLY WATERMARKED CLEARING BANK SPECIFICATION
22 1 SECURITY PAPER.
- 23 2. SECURE HOLOGRAPHIC FOIL THAT ACTS AS A VISUAL DETERRENT AND
24 ANTI-COPY FEATURE.
- 25 3. BRANDED OVERPRINT OF ANY HOLOGRAM THAT PERSONALIZES THE HOLOGRAM
26 WITH CUSTOMER LOGO.
- 27 4. CUSTOM COMPLEX SECURITY BACKGROUND DESIGNS WITH BANKNOTE-LEVEL
28 SECURITY.
- 29 5. SECURE VARIABLE DIGITAL INFILL.
- 30 6. THERMOCHROMIC, TRI-THERMOCHROMIC, PHOTOCHROMIC OR OPTICALLY
31 VARIABLE INKS.
- 32 7. STEALTH NUMBERING IN ULTRAVIOLET, INFRARED OR TAGGANT INKS.

1 8. MULTICOLORED MICRO-NUMISMATIC INVISIBLE ULTRAVIOLET DESIGNS.

2 9. UNIQUE FORENSIC FRAUD DETECTION TECHNOLOGY THAT IS BUILT INTO
3 SECURITY INKS.

4 10. UNIQUE BAR CODE OR QR CODE THAT IS ACCESSIBLE ONLY TO THE VOTER
5 AND THAT TRACKS THE VOTER'S BALLOT AS IT IS PROCESSED.

6 Sec. 3. Title 16, chapter 4, article 10, Arizona Revised Statutes,
7 is amended by adding section 16-604, to read:

8 16-604. Hand count tabulation reimbursement fund; purpose;
9 exemption

10 A. THE HAND COUNT TABULATION REIMBURSEMENT FUND IS ESTABLISHED
11 CONSISTING OF LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS. THE SECRETARY OF STATE SHALL
12 ADMINISTER THE FUND. MONIES IN THE FUND ARE CONTINUOUSLY APPROPRIATED.

13 B. MONIES IN THE FUND MAY BE USED ONLY TO REIMBURSE COUNTIES FOR
14 STAFFING COSTS DIRECTLY ASSOCIATED WITH HAND COUNT TABULATION OF STATE AND
15 FEDERAL ELECTION BALLOTS. THE SECRETARY OF STATE SHALL REIMBURSE COUNTIES
16 AT THE TEMPORARY CONTRACT RATE OF \$15 PER HOUR OR THE CURRENT MINIMUM WAGE,
17 WHICHEVER IS GREATER. SUBJECT TO AVAILABLE MONIES, THE SECRETARY OF STATE
18 SHALL REIMBURSE COUNTIES FOR HAND COUNT TABULATIONS FOR THE 2022 AND 2024
19 PRIMARY AND GENERAL ELECTIONS.

20 C. MONIES IN THE FUND ARE EXEMPT FROM THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION
21 35-190 RELATING TO LAPSING OF APPROPRIATIONS.

22 Sec. 4. Title 41, chapter 1, article 2, Arizona Revised Statutes, is
23 amended by adding section 41-123, to read:

24 41-123. Election forensic audit fund; purpose; investigations;
25 exemption

26 A. THE ELECTION FORENSIC AUDIT FUND IS ESTABLISHED CONSISTING OF
27 LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS. THE SECRETARY OF STATE SHALL ADMINISTER THE
28 FUND. MONIES IN THE FUND ARE CONTINUOUSLY APPROPRIATED. MONIES IN THE
29 FUND MAY BE USED ONLY TO CONDUCT INVESTIGATIONS AND FORENSIC AUDITS OF
30 ELECTIONS IN THIS STATE AS PRESCRIBED BY THIS SECTION.

31 B. ANY QUALIFIED ELECTOR MAY MAKE A COMPLAINT TO THE SECRETARY OF
32 STATE ALLEGING FRAUD OR OTHER UNLAWFUL ACTIVITY WITH RESPECT TO AN

1 ELECTION. THE SECRETARY OF STATE MAY CONDUCT A PRELIMINARY INVESTIGATION
2 OF THE COMPLAINT AND, IF THE SECRETARY OF STATE DETERMINES THERE IS
3 PROBABLE CAUSE TO BELIEVE THAT FRAUD OR OTHER UNLAWFUL ACTIVITY OCCURRED
4 WITH RESPECT TO AN ELECTION, THE SECRETARY OF STATE MAY ORDER A FORENSIC
5 AUDIT OF THAT ELECTION. THE AUDIT SHALL BEGIN WITHIN FOURTEEN DAYS AFTER
6 THE SECRETARY OF STATE'S ORDER.

7 C. WITHIN FOURTEEN DAYS AFTER COMPLETING THE FORENSIC AUDIT AND A
8 REPORT OF ITS FINDINGS, THE SECRETARY OF STATE SHALL REFER TO THE ATTORNEY
9 GENERAL FOR FURTHER INVESTIGATION ANY FINDINGS OF POSSIBLE CRIMINAL
10 ACTIVITY WITH RESPECT TO THE ELECTION.

11 D. MONIES IN THE ELECTION FORENSIC AUDIT FUND ARE EXEMPT FROM THE
12 PROVISIONS OF SECTION 35-190 RELATING TO LAPSING OF APPROPRIATIONS.

13 Sec. 5. Title 41, chapter 1, article 5, Arizona Revised Statutes, is
14 amended by adding section 41-191.12, to read:

15 41-191.12. Unreported in-kind political contributions task
16 force fund; joint task force on unreported
17 in-kind political contributions; appropriation;
18 exemption

19 A. THE UNREPORTED IN-KIND POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS TASK FORCE FUND IS
20 ESTABLISHED CONSISTING OF LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS. THE ATTORNEY GENERAL
21 SHALL ADMINISTER THE FUND. MONIES IN THE FUND ARE CONTINUOUSLY
22 APPROPRIATED. MONIES IN THE FUND MAY BE USED ONLY TO FUND THE JOINT TASK
23 FORCE ON UNREPORTED IN-KIND POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS ESTABLISHED BY THIS
24 SECTION.

25 B. THE JOINT TASK FORCE ON UNREPORTED IN-KIND POLITICAL
26 CONTRIBUTIONS IS ESTABLISHED CONSISTING OF DESIGNEES OF THE ATTORNEY
27 GENERAL AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE. THE JOINT TASK FORCE SHALL INVESTIGATE
28 WHETHER AND TO WHAT EXTENT THE BUSINESS OR OTHER PRACTICES OF SOCIAL MEDIA
29 PLATFORMS AND INTERNET SEARCH ENGINES RESULT IN UNREPORTED IN-KIND
30 POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS TO CANDIDATES IN THIS STATE IN VIOLATION OF TITLE
31 16, CHAPTER 6 AND MAY TAKE ENFORCEMENT ACTION AS APPROPRIATE. THE JOINT

1 TASK FORCE MAY INVESTIGATE THE FOLLOWING ACTIONS AS POSSIBLE UNLAWFUL
2 POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS:

3 1. PERMANENT OR TEMPORARY CANCELLATION OR OTHER RESTRICTIONS ON A
4 CANDIDATE'S ACCESS TO A SOCIAL MEDIA PLATFORM.

5 2. ALGORITHMIC BIAS AGAINST ONE OR MORE CANDIDATES OR A POLITICAL
6 PARTY.

7 3. ALGORITHMIC PROMOTION OF ONE OR MORE CANDIDATES OR A POLITICAL
8 PARTY.

9 C. BEGINNING IN FISCAL YEAR 2021-2022, THE SUM OF \$500,000 IS
10 APPROPRIATED FROM THE STATE GENERAL FUND IN EACH FISCAL YEAR TO THE
11 UNREPORTED IN-KIND POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS TASK FORCE FUND. MONIES IN THE
12 UNREPORTED IN-KIND POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS TASK FORCE FUND ARE EXEMPT FROM
13 THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 35-190 RELATING TO LAPSING OF APPROPRIATIONS.

14 Sec. 6. Section 41-1279.03, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to
15 read:

16 41-1279.03. Powers and duties; appropriation; exemption

17 A. The auditor general shall:

18 1. Prepare an audit plan for approval by the committee and report to
19 the committee the results of each audit and investigation and other reviews
20 conducted by the auditor general.

21 2. Conduct or cause to be conducted at least biennial financial and
22 compliance audits of financial transactions and accounts kept by or for all
23 state agencies subject to the single audit act of 1984 (P.L. 98-502). The
24 audits shall be conducted in accordance with generally accepted
25 governmental auditing standards and accordingly shall include tests of the
26 accounting records and other auditing procedures as may be considered
27 necessary in the circumstances. The audits shall include the issuance of
28 suitable reports as required by the single audit act of 1984 (P.L. 98-502)
29 so that the legislature, the federal government and others will be informed
30 as to the adequacy of financial statements of ~~the~~ THIS state in compliance
31 with generally accepted governmental accounting principles and to determine
32 whether this state has complied with laws and regulations that may have a

1 material effect on the financial statements and on major federal assistance
2 programs.

3 3. Perform procedural reviews for all state agencies at times
4 determined by the auditor general. These reviews may include evaluation of
5 administrative and accounting internal controls and reports on these
6 reviews.

7 4. Perform special research requests, special audits and related
8 assignments as designated by the committee and conduct performance audits,
9 special audits, special research requests and investigations of any state
10 agency, whether created by the constitution or otherwise, as may be
11 requested by the committee.

12 5. Annually on or before the fourth Monday of December, prepare a
13 written report to the governor and to the committee that contains a summary
14 of activities for the previous fiscal year.

15 6. In the tenth year and in each fifth year thereafter in which a
16 transportation excise tax is in effect in a county as provided in section
17 42-6106 or 42-6107, conduct a performance audit that:

18 (a) Reviews past expenditures and future planned expenditures of the
19 transportation excise revenues and determines the impact of the
20 expenditures in solving transportation problems within the county and, for
21 a transportation excise tax in effect in a county as provided in section
22 42-6107, determines whether the expenditures of the transportation excise
23 revenues comply with section 28-6392, subsection B.

24 (b) Reviews projects completed to date and projects to be completed
25 during the remaining years in which a transportation excise tax is in
26 effect. Within six months after each review period, the auditor general
27 shall present a report to the speaker of the house of representatives and
28 the president of the senate detailing findings and making recommendations.

29 (c) Reviews, determines, reports and makes recommendations to the
30 speaker of the house of representatives and the president of the senate
31 whether the distribution of ARIZONA highway user revenues complies with
32 title 28, chapter 18, article 2.

1 7. If requested by the committee, conduct performance audits of
2 counties and incorporated cities and towns receiving ARIZONA highway user
3 revenue fund monies pursuant to title 28, chapter 18, article 2 to
4 determine whether the monies are being spent as provided in section
5 28-6533, subsection B.

6 8. Perform special audits designated pursuant to law if the auditor
7 general determines that there are adequate monies appropriated for the
8 auditor general to complete the audit. If the auditor general determines
9 the appropriated monies are inadequate, the auditor general shall notify
10 the committee.

11 9. Establish a schoolwide audit team in the office of the auditor
12 general to conduct performance audits and monitor school districts to
13 determine the percentage of every dollar spent in the classroom by the
14 school district. Each school district shall prominently post on its
15 website home page a copy of its profile pages that displays the percentage
16 of every dollar spent in the classroom by that school district from the
17 most recent status report issued by the auditor general pursuant to this
18 paragraph. The performance audits shall determine whether school districts
19 that receive monies from the Arizona English language learner fund
20 established by section 15-756.04 and the statewide compensatory instruction
21 fund established by section 15-756.11 comply with title 15, chapter 7,
22 article 3.1. The auditor general shall determine, through random
23 selection, the school districts to be audited each year, subject to review
24 by the joint legislative audit committee. A school district that is
25 subject to an audit pursuant to this paragraph shall notify the auditor
26 general in writing whether the school district agrees or disagrees with the
27 findings and recommendations of the audit and whether the school district
28 will implement the findings and recommendations, implement modifications to
29 the findings and recommendations or refuse to implement the findings and
30 recommendations. The school district shall submit to the auditor general a
31 written status report on the implementation of the audit findings and
32 recommendations every six months for two years after an audit conducted

1 pursuant to this paragraph. The auditor general shall review the school
2 district's progress toward implementing the findings and recommendations of
3 the audit every six months after receipt of the district's status report
4 for two years. The auditor general may review a school district's progress
5 beyond this two-year period for recommendations that have not yet been
6 implemented by the school district. The auditor general shall provide a
7 status report of these reviews to the joint legislative audit committee.
8 The school district shall participate in any hearing scheduled during this
9 review period by the joint legislative audit committee or by any other
10 legislative committee designated by the joint legislative audit committee.

11 10. NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER LAW, REVIEW THE PROCESSES AND
12 STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS FOR MAINTAINING THE STATEWIDE VOTER REGISTRATION
13 DATABASE, COUNTY EARLY VOTER LISTS AND THE COUNTY VOTER REGISTRATION
14 DATABASES FOR COUNTIES WITH A POPULATION OF MORE THAN ONE MILLION PERSONS.
15 THE SECRETARY OF STATE AND THE COUNTY RECORDERS SHALL NOTIFY THE AUDITOR
16 GENERAL IN WRITING OF THE TOTAL EXPENDITURES MADE FOR VOTER REGISTRATION
17 PROGRAMS AND EVENTS AND SHALL PROVIDE A DESCRIPTION OF THOSE PROGRAMS AND
18 EVENTS INCLUDING ANY POLITICAL PARTY AFFILIATION. THE SECRETARY OF STATE
19 AND THE COUNTY RECORDERS ALSO SHALL SPECIFY THEIR ATTENDANCE AT THESE
20 PROGRAMS, EVENTS AND OUTREACH ACTIVITIES AND WHETHER THEY USED ANY
21 THIRD-PARTY DATA IN CONDUCTING THESE PROGRAMS, EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES. ON
22 OR BEFORE JUNE 30 OF EACH EVEN-NUMBERED YEAR, THE AUDITOR GENERAL SHALL
23 SUBMIT A REPORT ON ITS FINDINGS TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE
24 SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND SHALL SUBMIT A COPY OF THE
25 REPORT TO THE SECRETARY OF STATE.

26 ~~10.~~ 11. Annually review per diem compensation and reimbursement of
27 expenses for employees of this state and members of a state board,
28 commission, council or advisory committee by judgmentally selecting samples
29 and evaluating the propriety of per diem compensation and expense
30 reimbursements.

31 B. The auditor general may:

1 1. Subject to approval by the committee, adopt rules necessary to
2 administer the duties of the office.

3 2. Hire consultants to conduct the studies required by subsection A,
4 paragraphs 6 and 7 of this section.

5 C. If approved by the committee, the auditor general may charge a
6 reasonable fee for the cost of performing audits or providing accounting
7 services for auditing federal funds, special audits or special services
8 requested by political subdivisions of this state. Monies collected
9 pursuant to this subsection shall be deposited in the audit services
10 revolving fund.

11 D. The department of transportation, the board of supervisors of a
12 county that has approved a county transportation excise tax as provided in
13 section 42-6106 or 42-6107 and the governing bodies of counties, cities and
14 towns receiving ARIZONA highway user revenue fund monies shall cooperate
15 with and provide necessary information to the auditor general or the
16 auditor general's consultant.

17 E. The department of transportation shall reimburse the auditor
18 general as follows, and the auditor general shall deposit the reimbursed
19 monies in the audit services revolving fund:

20 1. For the cost of conducting the studies or hiring a consultant to
21 conduct the studies required by subsection A, paragraph 6, subdivisions (a)
22 and (b) of this section, from monies collected pursuant to a county
23 transportation excise tax levied pursuant to section 42-6106 or 42-6107.

24 2. For the cost of conducting the studies or hiring a consultant
25 pursuant to subsection A, paragraph 6, subdivision (c) and paragraph 7 of
26 this section, from the Arizona highway user revenue fund.

27 F. BEGINNING IN FISCAL YEAR 2021-2022, THE SUM OF \$500,000 IS
28 APPROPRIATED FROM THE STATE GENERAL FUND IN EACH FISCAL YEAR TO THE AUDITOR
29 GENERAL FOR PURPOSES PRESCRIBED BY SUBSECTION A, PARAGRAPHS 10 AND 11 OF
30 THIS SECTION.

1 G. THE APPROPRIATION MADE IN SUBSECTION F OF THIS SECTION IS EXEMPT
2 FROM THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 35-190 RELATING TO LAPSING OF
3 APPROPRIATIONS.

4 Sec. 7. Appropriation; department of administration; antifraud
5 paper and equipment; exemption

6 A. The sum of \$4,000,000 is appropriated from the state general fund
7 in fiscal year 2021-2022 to the department of administration to reimburse
8 counties for the costs of purchasing antifraud ballot paper and equipment
9 for the 2022 and 2024 primary and general elections as prescribed by
10 section 16-504, Arizona Revised Statutes, as added by this act.

11 B. The appropriation made in subsection A of this section is exempt
12 from the provisions of section 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes, relating
13 to lapsing of appropriations.

14 Sec. 8. Appropriation; hand count tabulation reimbursement
15 fund; exemption

16 A. The sum of \$3,700,000 is appropriated from the state general fund
17 in fiscal year 2021-2022 to the hand count tabulation reimbursement fund
18 established by section 16-604, Arizona Revised Statutes, as added by this
19 act.

20 B. The appropriation made in subsection A of this section is exempt
21 from the provisions of section 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes, relating
22 to lapsing of appropriations.

23 Sec. 9. Appropriation; election forensic audit fund; exemption

24 A. The sum of \$2,000,000 is appropriated from the state general fund
25 in fiscal year 2021-2022 to the election forensic audit fund established by
