Increasing Awareness on Privilege, Racism, and Microaggression & Generational Trauma

Given the diversity that exists within the United States, it's essential to understand our cultural heritage as well as our clients'. Many times, one's cultural can be overlooked in treatment, which becomes barriers in engaging the youth and their families. Providers will learn to increase their awareness of privilege and discrimination. Participants will also learn how to facilitate a culturagram with clients.

It's essential for providers to understand generational trauma and how to work with system-involved youth from a generational perspective. Without this perspective, we can have unrealistic expectations for youth and their families and encounter barriers to engagement.

The Impact of Poverty and the Impact of Mass Incarceration for Youth

It's essential for providers working with system-involved youth to understand how their socioeconomic upbringing impacts their ability to understand poverty and the challenges to exit poverty. The trainer will discuss strategies for more effectively engaging individuals and families in poverty and ways to empower them. It is imperative to understand challenges poverty presents as it can be a risk factor for a variety of unhealthy and dangerous situations such as mental illness, gang involvement, involvement in the commercial sex industry, etc.

Given the disproportion number of people of color in the prison population, it is important to understand mass incarceration and how it impacts youth.

Providers will learn strategies to support youth with generational patterns of trauma within their families.

The training will focus on the historical context of mass incarceration, why mass incarceration exists, how it impacts youth, and strategies to support youth who have an incarcerated parent.

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

Meet Our Speaker:

Nicole Klasey is a clinical psychologist who consults with agencies on trauma-informed care, programming for commercially sexually exploited children (CSEC), culturally responsive services, vicarious trauma, and leadership development. Nicole has been training multidisciplinary audiences on trauma-related topics since 2015. She has developed several of the training curriculums that are being utilized throughout California to better equip providers on working with commercially sexually exploited youth and youth at-risk of recruitment of CSEC. She is currently in the process of publishing a book, "Embrace the Journey: Applying the Stages of Change with Commercially Sexually Exploited Girls" and has started a second book on applying harm reduction with CSEC. She has been an expert witness on CSEC and trauma in court. Her work has been recognized by Los Angeles County leaders and she has been awarded the State of California Senate Certificate of Recognition by Senator Joel Anderson.

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
