Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Under current law, the administrator of the Elections Commission is required to enter into a membership agreement with the Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) to assist the commission in maintaining Wisconsin’s official voter registration list.

This bill terminates Wisconsin’s membership agreement with ERIC and directs the administrator of the Elections Commission to undertake all actions necessary and proper to effect that termination. The bill also expressly prohibits the commission and any other state agency from entering into a membership agreement with ERIC.

For further information see the state fiscal estimate, which will be printed as an appendix to this bill.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Election Integrity

One of the major issues in our state and the entire country is election integrity. After the November 2020 election, legitimate concerns came up regarding the security and integrity of our state's electoral process. This issue was and continues to be a top priority for me. Elections are the foundation of our republic.

Our system of government can only operate smoothly when the public has faith and trust in the electoral process and the outcomes. I have introduced multiple election integrity bills designed to fix issues that were identified with our elections.

I am proud to have authored **AB 490**, which would eliminate Wisconsin's membership with ERIC; **AB 899**, which would abolish WEC; **AJR 101**, which is a constitutional amendment to prohibit ranked-choice voting; and **AB 21**, which would remove ineligible voters from the official voter registration list.

I'm committed to doing everything I can to aid in that restoration, and I won't stop until the job's done.

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

It has been a tremendous honor to represent the 59th Assembly District. During my first term in the legislature, I have worked diligently to lower taxes, fight for election integrity, expand broadband access, reduce the size of government, defend life, and protect our God-given constitutional rights.

This session included returning money to local governments through shared revenue, increasing funding for Wisconsin's roadways, eliminating the personal property tax, making significant investments into education, and increasing funding for broadband expansion programs.

We also voted to keep men out of women's sports, protected children and minors from sex change surgery, and a constitutional amendment to keep Zuckerbucks out of the state. On Tuesday, October 17th, the Wisconsin State Assembly passed a resolution honoring first responders for their service from around the state.

Paul began his career in corrections on October 17th, 1994 after departing the United States Navy before retiring from the Department of Corrections on May 2nd this year.

Windmills within the 59th

I have been battling the windmill companies to keep them out of the 59th Assembly District. So far, we have been successful in doing so. Through awareness outreach, phone calls, and meetings, we have put the pressure on. Last year, I introduced **AB165**, which would give local governments more authority over wind companies.

I have been working on additional legislation with stakeholders as well. Your local state politicians' hands are tied in addressing this matter, due to the veto authority held by the Governor. Honestly, this is an issue that should have been tackled during previous administrations.

The complicating factor here is the substantial influx of lobbying funds from these companies. A significant majority of constituents have contacted me opposing these wind farms moving into their backyards. These companies were exploring Stockbridge, Chilton, Wayne, Scott, Mitchell, Auburn, and Ashford.

I completely agree that people should be able to do whatever they want with their properties, however, with windmills, they would be making that money off of taxpayer subsidies, paid for by their neighbors who would be hit with property value loss, health concerns, shadow cast, light flicker, noise pollution, disrupt wildlife & bird migration, and reduced farmland.

These windmills cross a line and it's a double whammy to their communities. If a landowner wants to put up a windmill to power something on their property, then no one should stand in the way of that. In November, a wind company that was planning to set up shop here flew into Madison from the eastern U.S. to discuss the proposed projects and to face the questions and concerns I had.

I approached the conversation professionally but sternly, letting them know that they were not welcome unless there were significant changes, but those changes were not something they were willing to make.

This company has since told me they are no longer interested in our area. There are other energy companies out there, but this battle was won, and we can celebrate that. If these companies ever want to feel welcomed, they need to come to the table and be willing to work with the locals. Until that happens, they are setting themselves up for failure.

The Fight to Keep the Sturgeon off the Endangered Species List

Rep. Bodden Authors Letter Opposing Listing of Lake Sturgeon on Endangered Species List

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has been ordered by an Illinois federal judge to publish a determination on listing Lake Sturgeon as an endangered species by June 30, 2024. The court case number is 20C1227, which mandated the Department to issue a decision.

The issue originated from population concerns outside of our state where we are sure there are legitimate concerns, but we aim to ensure that Wisconsin is excluded from this list as our state has done an excellent job managing the population.



Lake Sturgeon holds a special place in the hearts of Wisconsinites, particularly in the regions surrounding Lake Winnebago, Lake Butte des Morts, Lake Winneconne, and Lake Poygan.

The annual sturgeon spearing season, an event deeply rooted in our cultural identity, commenced in February. This tradition brings together generations of residents, forging bonds and fostering a profound connection with our natural surroundings.

Listing the Lake Sturgeon as an endangered species in Wisconsin, particularly in the Fox Valley, could potentially result in the suspension or significant curtailment of the sturgeon spearing season. Such an outcome would not only impact the cultural fabric of our state but also harm the livelihoods of numerous spear fishermen and women, and local businesses that depend on this tradition for their economic well-being.

I will continue to fight the good fight to ensure that lake sturgeon are kept off the federal endangered species list.

Protecting Women Sports

The State Assembly recently approved **ASSEMBLY BILL 377** and **378** regulating K-12 as well as University of Wisconsin and technical college sports. These bills emphasize aligning athletic teams with participants' birth genders and prohibits gender transition medical interventions for individuals under the age of 18.

The primary aim is to uphold the integrity of women's sports, ensuring fair competition by preventing men from competing in women's sports. Additionally, it safeguards minors' health and decision-making by prohibiting sex changes for individuals under 18.

These bills establish a separate category allowing co-ed athletic competition. Under these legislative bills, athletes in interscholastic, intramural, or school-sponsored sports must compete based on their birth sex. Moreover, parental involvement is mandated in this process.

The [Electronic Registration Information Center](#) (ERIC) is a non-profit organization founded in 2012 with the stated mission of "helping states to improve the accuracy of America's voter rolls, increase access to voter registration for all eligible citizens, reduce election costs, and increase efficiencies in elections." ERIC collects personally identifiable information, including driver's license numbers and partial Social Security numbers, to cross-compare the voter registration data submitted by member states and detect instances of "double voting."

There have been growing concerns regarding the apparent contrast between what was promised and what has been delivered since Wisconsin became a member of ERIC in 2016. Eight states ([Alabama](#), [Florida](#), [Louisiana](#), [Missouri](#), [Ohio](#), [Texas](#), [Virginia](#) and [West Virginia](#)) have withdrawn from ERIC during the past two years following the refusal of its board of directors to implement reforms aimed at alleviating concerns related to transparency, data security, questionable mandates imposed on members, and the potential for partisan influence over ERIC's operations.

Rather than "assisting states" with increasing access to voter registration for all eligible voters, ERIC's [membership agreement](#) mandates it. ERIC effectively commandeers the public resources of state election administrators to solicit voter participation ("getting out the vote"), a function that has historically been reserved for political parties, candidate and campaign committees and other political organizations. States that fail to mail notices to 95% of "eligible but unregistered" voters every 425 days at [the taxpayers' expense](#) risk having their ERIC membership terminated.

Aside from the fact that ERIC does not receive information on registered voters who may have moved to non-member states, the ERIC membership agreement asserts that ERIC will only provide member states with data on voters who have cast "improper votes" (defined as voting more than once in the same state, in two different states, or in the name of a dead voter) upon written request. It remains unclear as to why this data is not automatically included alongside the other data regularly transmitted by ERIC to member states. Taken altogether, this has led many to question

whether ERIC's architects placed more of a priority on registering voters as opposed to ensuring the accuracy of voter registration lists.

LRB-1873 terminates Wisconsin's membership agreement with ERIC and prohibits the Wisconsin Elections Commission (WEC) and any other state agency from entering into a membership agreement with ERIC.

Rep. Bodden Expresses Support for Termination of ERIC Membership, Rebukes Meagan Wolfe

Madison, WI - State Representative Ty Bodden (R-Stockbridge) released the following statement regarding the need to end Wisconsin's membership with the Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC):

"I am proud to have drafted a bill that would terminate Wisconsin's membership with ERIC. ERIC was started with heavy influence from liberal partisan forces, and ERIC has not been forthcoming about voter data security or their dealings with third parties. To boot, Wisconsin Elections Commission (WEC) Commissioner Meagan Wolfe has been extremely incompetent, among other things, in managing our state's relations with ERIC. In a 2021 testimony before the Committee on Government Accountability and Oversight, she stated she is "well acquainted with ERIC's services and capabilities." Yet, the WEC under her watch did not utilize all of the data provided by ERIC that could be used to clean up the voter rolls. Like many on the left, she seems only concerned with using ERIC as a voter outreach tool. Regarding in-state double voting audits, Wolfe stated "These audits were conducted long before Wisconsin joined ERIC, and do not depend on its data." Whether the data (rarely) comes from ERIC or from in-state sources, Wolfe continues to ignore election integrity concerns, specifically with our voter rolls. ERIC is useless when it comes to in-state voter fraud measures, which only makes ERIC valuable as an interstate voter fraud database. Interstate voter roll concerns should be resolved with an organization that is less partisan, less incompetent, and more secure than ERIC is."

The Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) is a non-profit organization and currently the only program in the country in which member states can share their statewide voter registration lists in order to find individuals who are registered and potentially voting in multiple states. ERIC also provides information on deceased residents. In March 2016, under Act 261, Wisconsin obtained membership in ERIC. ERIC expanded to as many as 32 states before a recent withdrawal of nine states over concerns of partisanship, data security, and accountability.

Rep. Bodden continued, "Wisconsin deserves better than ERIC, and as always, certainly deserves better than Meagan Wolfe."
