
We received check #1703, a 50% deposit of the estimated fees, in the amount of \$164.39 on 8/26/24. Due to the lack of records, no further payment is required.



Background

The Secondary Road Patrol (SRP) and Traffic Accident Prevention program was created by Public Act 416 of 1978. This state program, often referred to as the SRP Program, provides Michigan county sheriffs' offices with funding to patrol county and local roads outside the limits of cities and villages. Deputies funded under the SRP program have the legislated responsibilities of traffic enforcement, traffic crash prevention and investigation, criminal law enforcement, and emergency assistance.

Secondary Road Patrol program data contained in this report is derived from reports submitted by participating sheriff offices as part of their reporting requirements. The data is collected on a fiscal-year basis, October 1 through September 30, of each year.

The sheriff's office is the primary agency responsible for providing certain services (see below) on the county's primary roads and local roads outside the boundaries of cities and villages. The sheriff's office also provides these services on any portion of any other highway or road within the boundaries of a state or county park.

Services to be Provided:

1. Patrolling and monitoring traffic violations
2. Enforcing the criminal laws of this state, violations of which are observed by or brought to the attention of the sheriff's office while providing the patrolling and monitoring required by Public Act 416 of 1978
3. Investigating accidents involving motor vehicles
4. Providing emergency assistance to persons on or near a highway or road patrolled as required by Public Act 416 of 1978

The sheriff's office shall provide these services, except for number two above, within a city or village if the legislative body of the local unit of government passes a resolution requesting the services.

Counties must enter into a contractual arrangement with the Office of Highway Safety Planning (OHSP) to receive funds. Funds can be spent to provide the services listed above as follows:



- Employing additional personnel
- Purchasing additional equipment for providing the services above, operating, and maintaining that equipment
- Enforcing law in the state and county parks within the county
- Providing selective motor vehicle inspection programs
- Providing traffic safety information and education programs in addition to those provided before the effective date of Public Act 416 of 1978

Allocation of Funds Under the Act

A county's share of the amount annually appropriated for Secondary Road Patrol and Traffic Accident Prevention shall be the same percentage that the county received, or was eligible to receive, of the total amount allocated to all counties pursuant to Section 12 of Act No. 51 of the Public Acts of 1951, as amended, being Section 247.662 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, less the amounts distributed for snow removal and engineers, during the period of July 1, 1976, through June 30, 1977.

Maintenance of Effort

SRP program funds are directed to supplement road patrol efforts by counties, not to supplant or replace county funding.

Maintenance of Effort (MOE) refers to the number of general road patrol deputies the county employed immediately before October 1, 1978, or October 1, 2021, whichever year the expenditure or level of road patrol is lower. The county must continue to retain at least this number of road patrol deputies to be eligible for funding. An agreement entered into to receive SRP funds shall be void if the county falls below this number.

If a county falls below its MOE, it must prove economic hardship and be forced to reduce general services commensurate with the reduction in road patrol to receive SRP program funds. If reductions become necessary during the year, the county is required to report this to the OHSP. The OHSP will determine if the reduction meets the requirements of Public Act 416 of 1978, as amended.

Improving Law Enforcement Coordination

To increase cooperation among state, county, and municipal agencies, county sheriffs recommend the reduction of duplicate services to ensure the maximum use of available resources. Some of the recommendations made by sheriffs to improve law enforcement coordination include:

- Additional officers to maintain a high level of police presence to help increase public safety and protection of our citizens
- Disseminate information on incidents to other agencies promptly via fax, email, and/or messenger through the mobile computer terminals in patrol units
- Consolidate special response teams, accident reconstruction, K-9 teams, and other specialized units to share among county, state, and local departments
- Multi-agency training
- Additional joint training sessions
- Update computer aided dispatch systems to link the sheriffs offices, the Michigan State Police, conservation officers, and city police departments into one dispatching system. Systems should include location data and rural tracking of available responders.
- Share specialized services, such as emergency response teams, artificial intelligence, evidence technicians, and crime laboratories
- Define key performance indicators to assess coordination effectiveness
- Conduct quarterly meetings, and sharing emails, and newsletters

Improving Law Enforcement Training

Based on information provided by the county sheriffs, additional training is needed in the areas of:

- Interdiction beyond the traffic stop
- Report writing
- Stopping commercial motor vehicles
- De-escalation techniques
- Fraudulent identification
- Leadership supervision
- Pursuit driving
- Traffic accident investigation

Improving Law Enforcement Communication Systems

Based on information provided by participating sheriffs, there is a need for continued development of communication systems. Deputies in 20 counties reported being unable to communicate with their radio dispatcher from their patrol vehicle. Two counties (Wexford and Arenac) reported that 100 percent of the county area is not reliably covered. Deputies in 30 counties reported being unable to communicate when using portable radios. One county (Calhoun) reported that 64 percent of the county is not reliably covered. This results in a potentially hazardous environment for both law enforcement and the public. In some cases, the communication equipment purchased for the existing dispatch facilities and field units is outdated, in need of continual repair, or completely inoperable. Participating sheriffs requested the following:

- 23 counties need additional system-wide equipment

- 19 counties need additional mobile equipment
- 21 counties need additional portable equipment
- Improvement of the 800-radio communication system throughout the state, radio amplifiers for schools, improved cell phone coverage, internet coverage, and radio upgrades

Improving Services Provided

County sheriffs recommended the following methods of improving the services provided under Public Act 416 of 1978, as amended:

- Provide more funding to increase the number of deputies, allow for more services, and ensure safe travels while on secondary roads for residents and visitors
- Additional time to work in troubled traffic areas
- More involvement to teach young drivers at driver's education classes
- Participation in community outreach programs where driving concerns are brought discussed
- Increase in overnight patrols as this is when there is an increase in the number of personal injury accidents, alcohol, and drug-related accidents
- Increase in overall funding
- Specialized equipment such as license plate readers, driver's license readers, fingerprint scanners, and facial recognition readers
- Utilizing drones and laser scanners when investigating crashes
- Provide aging driver traffic safety programs
- Drug detection training



SRP FY23 Activities

Activity data is derived from quarterly and annual program reports submitted to the OHSP by participating sheriff offices. For FY2023, the activity was compiled according to the state fiscal year October 1, 2022, through September 30, 2023.




